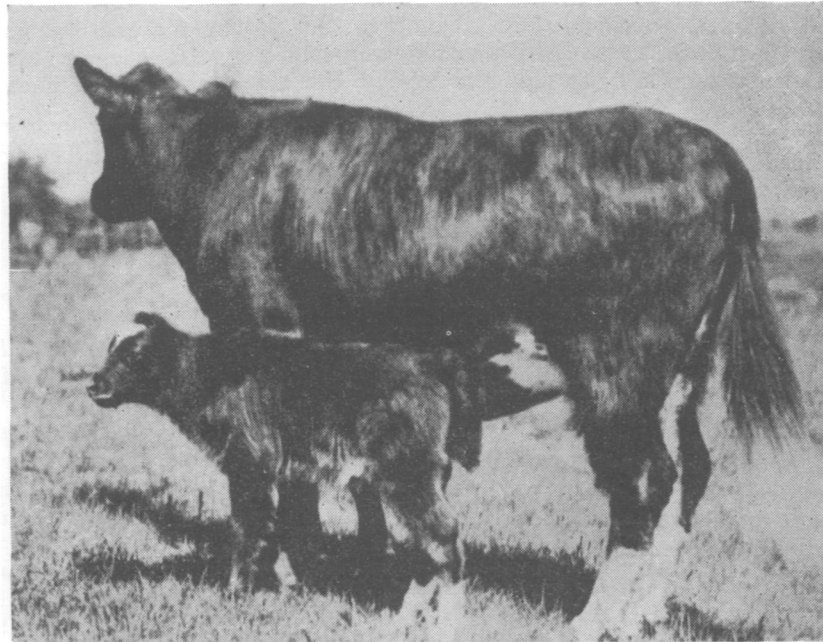

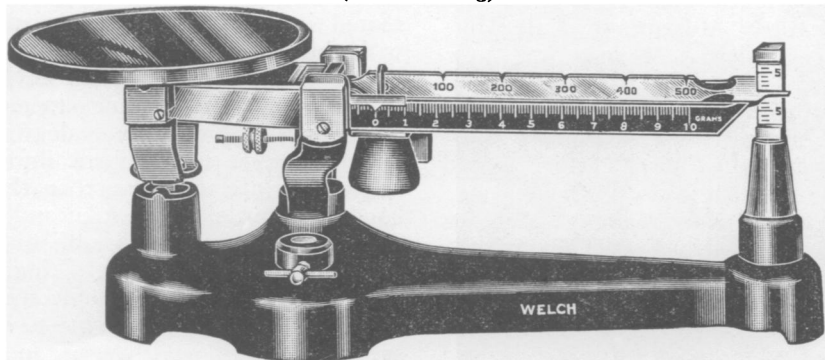

Thirty different plows are being tested in the corn borer area near Toledo, Ohio, to compare their usefulness in destroying the pests by plowing under cornstalks and refuse.
