DRAFTING PEN draws a continuous line, one millimeter thick, for 700 feet without refilling. Of West German design, the pen uses rubber-based, India or colored inks, or water colors. It is capable of producing line thicknesses ranging from .1 mm to 2.8 mm, according to the nib selected. Blotting is eliminated.

Easily wiped or washed clean, the pail is available with or without lid in seven colors.
