## **Modern Center Devoted** To Petroleum Research

> THREE NEW laboratories devoted to research on oil drilling, field and refinery production, and improvements of and new uses for petroleum products have been dedicated near Pittsburgh.

The laboratories are part of the research center of Gulf Oil Corporation at Harmarville, Pa. They feature an 80-foot drilling derrick rising through the roof of one building, 20 room-size engine test cells for measuring oil product performance factors, a 3,000,000 volt Van De Graaff particle accelerator for X-ray investigations, and facilities for radioactive tracer studies.
