Doctors Are Reading

Prostate Operations Safe for Heart Cases

➤ MOST ELDERLY men recover from the prostate gland operation even after heart attack, physicians report in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 182:908, 1962.

Only nine of 192 patients whose average age was well beyond 60 and all of whom had suffered myocardial infarction died following prostate surgery, Drs. Gershom J. Thompson, Panayotis P. Kelalis and Daniel C. Connolly of the Mayo Clinic and Mayo Foundation, Rochester, Minn., reported.

When "significant obstructive symptoms" are present, the operation should be performed, the Mayo doctors advised, although if recent major surgery has been performed they said it appears safer to postpone prostate surgery two or three months, during which time catheter drainage is used if necessary.

Surgery in Newborn

Operations on 400 infants with congenital heart disease resulted in the survival of 288, Drs. Denton A. Cooley, Stanley Berman and Felipe A. Santibanez-Woolrich of Baylor University College of Medicine, Houston, Texas, reported in JAMA (p. 192), pointing out that many needless deaths are occurring. Autopsies performed on 154 infants with abnormal hearts in Texas Children's Hospital, also in Houston, showed that 70 might have been saved by surgery.

Lung Disease Treatment

At least 23 different treatments are available for the lung disease, pulmonary emphysema, which is estimated to affect some 10 million persons in the United States, Dr. Theodore H. Noehren of the University of Buffalo School of Medicine, Buffalo, N. Y., reported in JAMA (p. 889). A genuine interest in the patient will help doctors determine which of the treatments alone or in combination will be successful.

Drugs for Stuttering

Although most drugs used to control stuttering have not been successful, dextro amphetamine sulfate (Dexedrine) has helped a few persons and may be tried on healthy patients, a Pennsylvania doctor said in JAMA (p. 976).

Stomach Ulcers From Caffeine

Hungry rats given large doses of caffeine get stomach ulcers. Drs. C. J. Pfeiffer and G. H. Gass of the Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, reported the study in the Canadian Journal of Biochemistry and Physiology, 40:1473, 1962. They gave caffeine alkaloid through stomach tubes to fasting rats. This caused them to become excited and chase and mutilate their tails.
