

AUTOMOBILE COMPASS for the motorist is a precision built instrument that has a new damping device to control the compass movement instead of the heavy liquid, thus eliminating leaks that cause compass failure. Light in weight, the instrument is sensitive and easy to read. The unit can be installed quickly with screws provided.

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PROTECTIVE CAP LINER gives protection against snow, sleet and icy winds. The water-repellent liner, worn under any type safety hat or cap, provides a warm comfortable shield for the head, ears and neck. Close-fitting, it has a combination of six slots and three snap fastener web straps. Available in two sizes.

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HEAT DETECTOR enables structural designers, electronic packaging engineers and others to detect heat on thin parts accurately to one percent. The device, an adhesive label 1/8-inch in width, contains a heat sensitive compound. When the temperature of the surface to which it is attached reaches the designated temperature, the label turns from white to black irreversibly. Temperatures from 100 degrees Fahrenheit and up can be set into the label.

Doctors Are Reading

Deep Breathing Can Cause Disease Symptoms

➤ DEEP BREATHING can be overdone.

U.S. Army Capt. Morton E. Tavel, Frankfurt, Germany, reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 187: 301, 1964, that overbreathing can produce some of the same symptoms caused by serious disease.

If deep inhalations are repeated often enough they can cause a symptom "complex" that can be confused with heart disease or brain circulation insufficiency.

Hyperventilation is a condition that occurs when cardiopulmonary disease is present, when there is damage to the respiratory center, or when anxiety and tension-conditions found in deep breathers—are present.

Other symptoms of overbreathing are giddiness and labored breathing, along with sensations of numbness, tingling, weakness, pain and muscle spasm.

Confusion arises when these sensations affect only one side of the body, Capt. Tavel explains. As in heart disease the symptoms sometimes localize predominantly in the upper extremity with pain in both the arm and chest. Deep breathing decreases the carbon dioxide in the blood, upsetting its acid-alkaline ratio.

In a study of 90 patients, Capt. Tavel found that 14, or 16%, had symptoms primarily affecting one side of the body. Of the 14, 12 had symptoms on the side opposite the dominant side.

Live Measles Vaccine Lasts

Two years after injection of the live measles-virus vaccine of Dr. John F. Enders, Harvard University and the Children's Medi-

cal Center, Boston, solid immunity against natural measles has been proved.

Reporting in the New England Journal of Medicine, 270:172, 1964, Drs. R. E. Weibel, J. Stokes Jr. and R. Halenda of the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, and Drs. E. B. Buynak and M. R. Hilleman of the Merck Institute, West Point, Pa., said they believe live vaccine-induced immunity will be lasting.

Cases studied included children injected with accompanying gamma globulin, but the researchers said either with or without the human immune globulin, children would be safe against measles. Solid immunity was afforded against natural measles in two epidemics as well as in other circumstances.

Kidney Stone Third Largest

Successful removal of a kidney stone weighing 2 pound 9.5 ounces, from a 71-year-old man was reported in JAMA, 187:303, 1964. This stone may be the third or fourth largest to be reported in medical history, Dr. Harry M. Burros, Lt. Col. William H. Cooner and Dr. Carlos Pena, all of Philadelphia, said. The largest recorded stone reported in 1953, weighed 13 pounds, 14 ounces, the researchers said.

TV Medicitis Is New Disease

"TV medicitis" is the coined name of a new disease going around, Dr. A. M. Aibinder of New York said in JAMA, 187:307, 1964. Viewers watching medical dramas identify themselves with the actors and tell their doctors they have the same disease.
