

Doctors Are Reading

➤ WHEN A PERSON is treated for an open wound he should be injected with tetanus toxoid, regardless of whether he has been immunized previously, doctors are warned.

Every physician should make an effort to immunize all his patients routinely, however, two New York doctors said in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 188:625, 1964.

The possibility of minor injury is always present, they pointed out, and as summer vacation time approaches, tetanus (lockjaw) immunization is advisable regardless of the destination of travel.

Drs. Paul A. Skudder and James R. McCarroll of the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center said that the only large groups who have been actively immunized against this often-fatal infectious disease are veterans of the U.S. forces in World War II and those who had shots in childhood.

Kidney Disease Test

You may have kidney disease and not know it, a team of Harvard Medical School, Boston, Mass., physicians warn. They advise a simple screening test for this potentially dangerous condition, which often is undetected until it is too late for treatment.

Drs. Warren E. C. Wacker, Lionel E. Dorfman and Elias Amador explained in JAMA, 188:671, 1964, that a urine test can determine the telltale sign of kidney disease, which is increased activity of the enzyme, lactic dehydrogenase (LDH).

They say that even the most common kidney disease, chronic pyelonephritis, is undetected in 75% to 80% of cases.

Two Viruses Clash

A clash of two viruses was discovered when a seven-year-old boy contracted measles a week after he got chickenpox. The measles rash did not break out in areas around the crusted healing blisters of the original disease, which suggested to researchers that interferon had stopped the rash.

Interferon is a substance produced by a cell when it is infected by a virus that provides resistance to viruses in general. Further studies were advised to decide whether the severity of one disease had been modified by the other.

Drs. Vernon Knight, William E. Fleet and David J. Lang of the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Md., reported the case in JAMA, 188:690, 1964.

Blood Clot Treatment

The enzyme fibrinolysin, obtained from human blood, is valuable in treating blood clots in the lung unless patients are critically ill at the time of treatment, four Philadelphia doctors reported in JAMA, 188:628, 1964.

Drs. Harold L. Israel, George R. Fisher, Otto Mueller and David A. Cooper of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine said several cases of serum hepatitis had developed in patients taking fibrinolysin, but when this hazard is eliminated the remedy should be safe.
