

Ask for Sales Curb On Morning Glory Seeds

➤ CONTROLS over the sale of morning glory seeds, accused of producing hallucinations and possibly addiction, are urged in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Albert L. Ingram Jr., Pennsylvania State University, reported that eating morning glory seeds "has increased in the past months and at least one suicide has resulted."

When eaten, morning glory seeds can produce a psychic reaction similar to that of LSD, d-lysergic acid diethylamide, a

Dr. Ingram said that use of the seeds has perhaps been more noticeable on the college and university campus because the adolescent and young adult want to experiment.

"This poses a potential danger of some magnitude. As with LSD, latent phychoses can be activated and the neurotic can be physically addicted."

The LSD-like reaction of the seeds is most likely due, Dr. Ingram reported, to LSDlike alkaloids. Lysergic acids have been found in the seed but no pure LSD has yet been isolated.

The Food and Drug Administration has no immediate plans for federal controls but will review Dr. Ingram's findings.
