

Doctors Are Reading

Homosexuals Can Be Treated, Perhaps Cured

➤ ONLY ONE IN FOUR homosexuals can be "cured" in the sense of becoming attracted to the opposite sex, but physicians and psychiatrists should be prepared to treat the illness, a California psychiatrist says.

The homosexual is one whose personality growth was arrested, or who has regressed to an adolescent level, Dr. Philip H. Heersema of the department of psychiatry, Standford University Medical School, Stanford, Calif., stated in the Journal of the American Medical Association, 193:815, 1965.

The psychiatrist distinguishes between "reactors" and "attractors" among homosexuals. The reactors have been subjected to such psychologic forces as a dominant mother, a passive father, a masochistic mother, a brutalizing father or other extreme influences during their formative years.

The attractors are predominantly male, and offer a favorable chance for recovery if they can receive treatment by an understanding, skillful psychotherapist or a psychiatrically oriented physician, Dr. Heersema says.

Bent Spine Corrected Early

A type of spinal curvature called postural scoliosis can be corrected early if pediatricians look for it when babies are born, a British surgeon reported.

Sir Denis Browne, emeritus surgeon at the Hospital for Sick

Children, London, has devised a scoliosis splint that he describes in the British Medical Journal, Sept. 4, 1965.

A baby with postural scoliosis, which results from simple malposition in the mother's womb and not from any congenital deformity, can be kept in the splint 24 hours a day from six months to one year, and at the same time allowed to exercise. The child can be removed for washing and more strenuous exercise.

Enzyme Affects Muscle-Wasting Disease

Scientists could be close to finding the cause of the musclewasting disease, muscular dystrophy. An enzyme called cathepsin, one of the catalytic agents responsible for the breakdown of protein, has been found to be significantly increased in experimental muscular dystrophy.

Dr. A. Á. Iodice of the Institute for Muscle Disease Inc. and Dr. I. M. Weinstock found in their work with rabbits and chickens that the activity of cathepsin A is definitely increased in both nutritional and hereditary muscular dystrophy.

"It is noteworthy that the skeletal muscle of normal rabbits appears to be almost free of the enzyme, whereas in the breast muscle of the chicken the level of this enzyme is comparatively high and approaches that seen in muscle of the vitamin E-deficient rabbit," the researchers reported in Nature, 207:1102, 1965.

The U.S. Public Health Service and the Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America Inc., supported the work. A more complete report is planned soon.
