What can you do with a hammer? "Pound nails, sometimes pull them out again." Anything else? "Else? That's what a hammer's for." Alas, dear friend, you appear to be suffering from functional fixation.


"From what?" Put it this way: if you weren't bound by such a fixation, you would realize that a hammer could serve perfectly well as a paper weight, digging tool, door stop, ice crusher, lamp shade base, even a pan cover beater for children.

To get around this common human shortcoming, Eastman Kodak Company, Rochester, N.Y., runs a 10-week course in imagination for its executives and technicians. In the course of the course, as a two-week homework assignment, each student is given a "creativity kit" (commonly known as a junk box) consisting of string, pieces of cardboard, safety pins, popsicle sticks, buttons and other miscellaneous whatnot. The assignment is simply, "make something."

True creativity cannot be taught, admits one instructor, but people can learn to free themselves from the kinds of mental blocks that limit the number of solutions to any problem.


Climbing over mental blocks is a stimulating task, as indicated by the hundreds of different responses to the junk box assignment. Two are shown on these pages.

Executive creativity also produced, of all things, a digitalanalog computer that includes an abacus among its several computing devices, a "scudupper" to pick up golf balls for stiff golfers and a pea planter that looks like a child's pull toy to drop seeds into the garden at accurately spaced intervals.




