River Pirates

Rivers and streams sometimes turn into "pirates" and literally steal flowing water from one another.

This usually happens in the high-

lands or places where rivers are young and vigorous. As the turbulent head of a stream undercuts and erodes away the land, it recedes upstream and sometimes carves into the valley of another.

A contest then begins between the two streams for the available water supply. The stream that wins is the one that has a larger channel and steeper slope that makes it more accessible for water to drain downward toward the sea. Water that has been flowing into one river now turns and flows into another —the pirate has had its way. The other valley is left with only a trickle for a river, or no river at all. Geologists say this is the explanation for "wind gaps"—valleys down which the wind blows but no water flows.

In regions of the ancient Appalachian Mountains, where rivers have been cutting and eroding for millions of years, geologists have found many such curious wind gaps where water had been pirated by other streams.

River piracy is part of the whole process of land erosion that has been going on since the world began. In the constant flow of water to the sea, rivers have churned and loosened the land bit by bit, leveling the high points and filling the low hollows with sediment they have dragged sometimes for thousands of miles as they wind across the land.

Left to themselves, rivers would eventually erode and smooth the wrinkled crust of the whole earth into a round ball. Yet this will not happen, for powerful forces within the earth are constantly shifting masses of land and thrusting up new mountains-which the restless streams start all over again to erode away.
