Solitary Albatross

Powerful wanderer of the ocean sky and master of dynamic soaring, the albatross can live at sea for months, sleeping on the waves and feeding on fish, squid and other marine animals, with no need of land.

As big as a fat goose, with a large head, stocky body and extremely long narrow wings, the albatross is related to those ocean birds called the petrels, of the family Diomedeidae.

Unlike most other birds, the albatross has nostrils opening into hornlike tubes which lie along the upper part of its hooked bill, which is stout and covered with horny plates. With this nasal construction, the bird is able to consume salt water. An internal desalination process gives the bird's body what fresh water it needs, and discharges the excess salt from special glands in a highly saline solution that constantly drips from its bill.

There are 13 different species of this bird, some of which are black, brown and white, and some of which are almost totally white. Their names indicate their characters—the black-footed albatross, the sooty albatross, the shy albatross, the short-tailed albatross. The wandering albatross has the greatest wingspan of any bird—about 12 feet. Skillful performers, they can soar with the ocean wind currents for hours, scarcely moving their wings.

Sailors used to believe that anyone killing an albatross would bring bad luck upon himself and his ship—the central theme of Coleridge's "Rime of the Ancient Mariner." Despite the superstition, however, many sailors used to amuse themselves on long sailing voyages by catching the birds with hooked bait. For a while, the albatross in the North Pacific was systematically slaughtered for its feathers, and came close to extinction.
