

## To the Editor

### **Animal Living Quarters**

Sir:

Your article "Stanford Beasts to Live Well" (SN: 8/19) gives the impression that luxurious quarters are being built at great expense for already comfortably housed animals. It is unfortunate that reports of this kind frequently reveal more about the attitudes of their authors than about conditions for experimental animals. Anyone interested in the latter would want to know how much cage space was available for each type of animal used, and what provision for exercise.

The article reports that "65,000 animals" will be housed in "14,000 square feet of space with an additional 4,000 square feet of outdoor pens, kennels and exercise areas." If the space were evenly divided, each animal would have 6 by 7 inches. If there were 3 tiers of cages, each would have 10 by 12 inches. Obviously, it is important to know whether the animals are dogs or mice.

The report implies that good housing for experimental animals is typical and that the "filthy quarters pictured by animal lovers" do not exist. The fact is that conditions are sufficiently bad so that there is a great deal of complaining about coming up to even the very modest standards set by recent legislation.

Not even good housing, let alone simply expensive housing, means that "humane societies can rest assured that" the animals "will live well." Concern for their welfare is a necessary ingredient of insurance that they will live just reasonably decently.
