

Books of the Week

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AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT AND ECONOMIC GROWTH—Herman M. Southworth and Bruce F. Johnston, Eds.—Cornell Univ. Press, 1967, 608 p., folded map, \$12. Reviews and summarizes the chief problems and main trends of thought, appraises the adequacy and limitations of present knowledge, and suggests priorities for further research in agricultural economics in developing countries.

ALCOHOL PROBLEMS: A Report to the Nation by the Cooperative Commission of the Study of Alcoholism—Thomas F. A. Plaut—Oxford Univ. Press, 1967, 200 p., \$4.75. Presents the policy statement, including a report of findings and recommendations of the Commission established in 1961 to propose objectives for dealing with the alcohol problems in a modern society.

AMNESIA—C. W. M. Whitty and O. L. Zangwill, Eds., foreword by Sir Charles Symonds—Appleton, 1967, 217 p., \$12.50. A comprehensive review of the subject, deals with experimental studies, amnesia in cerebral disease, the amnesic syndrome, trauma, electroconvulsive therapy, psychogenic loss of memory, and medico-legal aspects.

BIOCHEMICAL GENETICS, Vol. 1, No. 1, June 1967—Charles R. Shaw, Ed.—Plenum Press, 71 p., illus., paper, quarterly, \$18 annually. Publishes original papers dealing with the molecular aspects of: genetic variation and evolution, population ecology, gene action, immunogenetics, and somatic cell genetics.

THE BOOK REVOLUTION—Robert Escarpit—UNESCO (Unesco Pubns. Center, N.Y.), 160 p., diagrams, tables, \$3.50. Thorough worldwide study of important changes in the functions of books, statistics of world production, main exchange patterns, and other aspects of publishing.

CARBURETORS & CARBURETION—Walter B. Larew—Chilton Bks., 1967, 166 p., diagrams, \$7.95. Authoritative information for students and engineers interested in the principles and design of carburetors, both automotive and aeronautical.

CAREERS AND OPPORTUNITIES IN COMPUTER SCIENCE—John M. Carroll—Dutton, 191 p., photographs, \$3.95. Career guide with bibliography.

CHALLENGES IN INDIA—Taya Zinkin—Walker & Co., 1967, 248 p., \$6.50. Thoughtful essays on the situation in India, on such topics as steel, Indian Muslims, corruption, the young Indians and India's potentialities.

THE COMING REVOLUTION IN MEDICINE—David D. Rutstein—M.I.T. Press, 1967, 180 p., \$4.95. Four essays analyzing the general defects of our present medical system and proposing changes for necessary improvement.

COWLES ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SCIENCE, INDUSTRY AND TECHNOLOGY—Benedict A. Leeburger, Jr., Ed.—Cowles Educ. Corp., 1967, 510 p., photographs, diagrams, transparencies, \$9.95. Arranged by major areas of science, the volume offers quick reference to some 9,000 entries, including authoritative articles, bibliographies and glossaries.

DEEP VALLEY—Burt W. and Ethel G. Aginsky—Stein & Day, 1967, 224 p., \$5.95. Based on 25 years of research, two anthropologists recreate an American aboriginal culture, the Pomo Indians in the early 19th century, prior to white contact.

DIARY OF FLORENCE IN FLOOD—Katharine Kressmann Taylor—Simon & Schuster, 1967, 192 p., map, \$4.50. An eyewitness account of the November 1966 disaster that befell Florence and of the response of its people.

A DICTIONARY OF ANGELS Including the Fallen Angels—Gustav Davidson—Free Press, 1967, 387 p., 105 illus., \$15. Culled from Talmudic, gnostic, cabalistic, apocalyptic and legendary texts, the book provides information on thousands of angels, from A'Albiel to Zurriel. Appendix gives celestial orders, hierarchies, tables, charts, pacts and bibliography.

THE DIFFERENCE OF MAN AND THE DIFFERENCE IT MAKES—Mortimer J. Adler—Holt, 395 p., \$7.95. Constructs a logic of difference to determine the various ways in which man differs from everything else and reviews the evidence from the fields of biology, paleoanthropology, neurology, behavioral psychology and computer technology.

DIRECTORY OF UNITED STATES STANDARDIZATION ACTIVITIES—Joan E. Hartman—NBS (GPO), 1967, 276 p., \$2. Descriptive inventory of the fields, products and services of nearly 500 organizations involved in developing and disseminating standards in the U.S.

ETHNOGRAPHIC ATLAS—George Peter Murdock—Univ. of Pittsburgh Press, 1967, 128 p., \$4.95. Presents systematic effort to organize the descriptive information on the peoples of the world—primitive, historical and contemporary—through classification by clusters, codes and tabulated data on 862 of the most thoroughly studied societies.

THE FUTURE AS NIGHTMARE: H. G. Wells and the Anti-utopians—Mark R. Hillegas—Oxford Univ. Press, 1967, 200 p., \$5.75. A scholarly investigation of the contemporary literary phenomenon of anti-utopian science fiction and the pervasive influence of H. G. Wells.

THE IMPACT OF THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION 1917-1967—Neil McInness and others, introd. by Arnold Toynbee—Oxford Univ. Press, 1967, 357 p., \$7.50. Sponsored by the Royal Institute of International Affairs, four authorities on various aspects of the revolution weigh its actual accomplishments against claims and assess its effects on the outside world.

INORGANIC SYNTHESIS, Vol. X—Earl L. Muettterties, Ed.—McGraw-Hill, 1967, 218 p., illus., \$9.95. Latest collection of 58 of the best tested methods for the synthesis of inorganic chemical substances, including a synthesis of dimethylarsine.

INVERTEBRATE ZOOLOGY, Vol. I: Porifera, Cnidaria, Platyhelminthes, Aschelminthes, Mollusca, Annelida and Related Phyla—Alfred Kaestner, transl. and adapted from 2nd German ed. by Herbert W. Levi and Lorna R. Levi—Interscience, 1967, 597 p., illus., \$27.50. First of four-volume systematic and broadly conceived work examining the function of structures, habits and adaptations of species.

JAPAN'S DECISIVE CENTURY, 1867-1967—Shigeru Yoshida—Praeger, 1967, 110 p., photographs, \$4.95. Statement on the accomplishments of a successfully modernized Far Eastern nation.

JET STREAMS: How Do They Affect Our Weather?—Elmar R. Reiter—Doubleday, 1967, 189 p., plates, diagrams, \$5.95. Up-to-date authoritative treatment for secondary school students and the layman, exploring the intense winds at very high altitudes.

KITES: An Historical Survey—Clive Hart—Praeger, 1967, 196 p., color plates, photographs, diagrams, \$12.50. A survey of 2,500 years of the kite's history with emphasis on the development of the technologically advanced Western kite.

LETTERS ON WAVE MECHANICS: Schrödinger, Planck, Einstein, Lorentz—K. Przibram, Ed., transl. and introd. by Martin J. Klein—Philosophical Lib., 1967, 75 p., illus., \$6. Contemporary exchange of letters among physicists reflecting their reactions to a major scientific idea.

THE LIFE OF PRAIRIES AND PLAINS—Durward L. Allen—McGraw-Hill, 1967, 232 p., color photographs, drawings, maps, \$4.95. Deals with the ecological community of the vast, undisturbed grasslands as they existed before the discovery of America.

LORDS OF CUSCO: A History and Description of the Inca People in Their Final Days—Burr Cartwright Brundage—Univ. of Okla. Press, 1967, 458 p., drawings from Huaman Poma, \$6.95. History of the Inca caste from the inception of Huayna Capac's rule to the year of their extinction, 1572, based on original contemporary or near-contemporary sources.

A MATHEMATICIAN'S APOLOGY—G. H. Hardy, foreword by C. P. Snow—Cambridge Univ. Press, 1967, 153 p., \$2.95. Reissue of book first published in 1940, with new introduction.

MICROBIAL TECHNOLOGY—Henry J. Pepper, Ed.—Reinhold, 1967, 454 p., illus., \$14. Presents the current state of development of new microbiological practices and updates older processes.

MILD MENTAL RETARDATION: A Growing Challenge to the Physician—Committee on Mental Retardation—Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, 1967, 60 p., paper, \$1 direct to GAP, 104 E. 25th St., New York 10010. Discusses the diagnosis, psychopathology, etiology, prevention and treatment of that segment of the population characterized by impaired intelligence and impaired adaptation (I.Q. between 50 and 70).

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
