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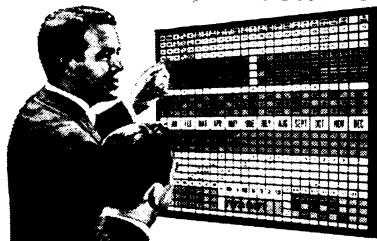

ASSIGNMENT: SHOOT THE MOON. 16mm, color, sound, 28 min. Portrait of the moon based on thousands of photographs of the lunar surface and its features. Shows how close-up studies of the moon by the Ranger, Surveyor and Lunar Orbiter spacecraft have provided an important aid for the men who will first set foot on lunar soil. Audience: general. THE DISEASE CALLED ALCOHOLISM. 16mm, color, sound, 24 min.
