GUTS: The Form and Function of the Digestive System—John Morton—St. Martin's Press, 1967, 63 p., illus., paper, \$1.50. Deals with the alimentary canal of herbivores and omnivores, deposit feeders, carnivores, filter feeders and fluid feeders, linking the study on the one hand with ecology, on the other with biochemistry.

HANDBOOK OF LABORATORY SAFETY—Norman V. Steere, Ed.—Chemical Rubber Co., 1967, 568 p., illus., \$17.50. Useful information for preventing or controlling accidents, injuries, fires and losses in laboratories in educational institutions, hospitals, industry or elsewhere.

HANDBOOK OF PHYSICS—E. U. Condon and Hugh Odishaw, Eds.—McGraw-Hill, 1967, 2nd ed., 1626 p., diagrams, 64-page index, \$32.50. Prepared by a staff of specialists, this concise, critical survey of physics reflects latest findings, contains new material on theory of relativity, conduction of electricity in gases, superconductivity, magnetic resonance and nuclear physics.

HORIZON: Winter, 1968, Vol. X, No. 1—Joseph J. Thorndike, Ed.—Am. Heritage Pub. Co., 1968, 120 p., illus., \$5. Contains two articles on archaeology, about the body found in the Tollund peat bog, and the Minoan ring unearthed on Crete, as well as a fully illustrated article entitled "Joseph Needham and the Science of China" by Derek J. de Solla Price.

LECTURES ON QUANTUM STATISTICS, Vol. 1: Quantum Statistics—N. N. Bogoliubov, transl. from Ukrainian, rev. by author, ed. by L. Klein and S. Glass—Gordon & Breach, 1967, 242 p., \$12.50. Deals with basic concepts, with the method of second quantization, the theory of Bose-Einstein gas, and the theory of the polar model of metals.

LIQUID CRYSTALS: Proceedings of the International Conference held at Kent State University, 1965—Glenn H. Brown, C. J. Dienes and M. M. Labes, Eds.—Gordon & Breach, 1967, 486 p., illus, \$30. Papers range from the investigation of lipid-water systems by classical and N.M.R. methods, to paracrystals as models for liquid crystals. liquid crystals.

THE MATHEMATICAL PRINCIPLES OF QUANTUM MECHANICS—Derek F. Lawden—Methuen (Barnes & Noble), 1967, 280 p., \$8. The subject is developed in a systematic and logical manner from a minimum set of axioms, intended to appeal to applied mathematicians and mathematical physicists for whom aesthetic considerations are not unimportant.

NEW LIGHT ON JUVENILE DELINQUENCY—Ronald Steel, Ed.—Wilson Co., 1967, 221 p., \$3.50. Articles and excerpts from books discussing such topics as the affluent delinquent, teenage drinking, the tense generation, the adolescent ghetto, the delinquent and the law.

OPTICAL COHERENCE THEORY: Recent Developments—G. J. Troup—Methuen (Barnes & Noble), 1967, 76 p., \$3.75. Discusses in condensed form some of the new theoretical developments, with supporting experiments.

OTHER WORLDS THAN OURS—C. Maxwell Cade—Taplinger, 1967, 248 p., 23 plates, illus., \$4.95. Conceived as an introduction to the new science of exobiology, the author explores both scientifically and philosophically the notion of other worlds in the light of modern knowledge.

PERSONALITY: Selected Readings—Richard S. Lazarus and Edward M. Opton, Jr.—Penguin Bks., 464 p., paper, \$1.95. A collection of 22 seminal articles and excerpts on theoretical and experimental work.

PETROLEUM PROCESSING HANDBOOK—William F. Bland and Robert L. Davidson, Eds.—McGraw-Hill, 1967, 1076 p., illus., \$37.50. Comprehensive, up-to-date and authoritative handbook covering in 14 sections the major aspects of modern petroleum refining.

PHOTOSYNTHESIS OF PRODUCTIVE SYSTEMS—A. A. Nichiporovich, Ed. transl. from Russian by N. Kaner; J. L. Monteith, Ed.—IPST (Daniel Davey, N.Y.), 1967, 182 p., diagrams, \$10.75. Topics range from the aims of research on the photosynthesis of plants as a factor in productivity, to a mathematical model of an aquatic ecological system.

THE POLITICAL BELIEFS OF AMERICANS: A Study of Public Opinion—Lloyd A. Free and Hadley Cantril—Rutgers Univ. Press, 1968, 239 p., tables, \$10. A study of American political beliefs, values and attitudes as regards not only national but international issues, based on a survey carried out by two Gallup polls during the 1964 Presidential campaign.
