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AFRICAN ART: Sculpture—Pierre Meauze, transl. from French—World Pub. Co. 1968, 220 p., color plates, photographs, folded map, \$25. Lavishly illustrated, presents short historical survey, materials, techniques, and varied styles from Guinea to Azande, with emphasis on masks and statues imbued with magic.

ARCTIC BIOLOGY—Henry P. Hansen, Ed.—Ore. State Univ. Press, 1967, 2nd ed., 318 p., illus., \$6.50. Reprint of papers of the Biology Colloquium held in 1957, includes 1965 paper on host-parasite relationships among arctic wildlife.

BIRDS OF SOUTH VIETNAM—Philip Wildsch—Tuttle, 1968, 234 p., 25 color plates, \$7.50. Depicts and describes nearly 600 species of birds, many of them found throughout Southeast Asia, with 236 species illustrated by author.

CERAMICS IN THE MODERN WORLD: Man's First Technology Comes of Age—Maurice Chandler—Doubleday, 1968, 192 p., illus., \$5.95; paper, \$2.45. Surveys the development of ceramics from clay and bricks, pottery, glazes, through electrical properties, refractories, to the recent heat-resistant ceramic materials.

COMPUTERIZED PROCESS CONTROL: A Management Decision—Harry L. Cornish, Jr., William L. Horton and others, foreword by Theodore J. Williams—Hobbs, Dorman & Co., 1968, 212 p., \$12.50. Report in depth on the technical feasibility of the control computer and its application in industry.

CONTEMPORARY ISSUES IN DEVELOPMENTAL PSYCHOLOGY—Norman S. Endler, Lawrence R. Boulter and Harry Osser, Eds., foreword by J. McV. Hunt—Holt, 1968, 682 p., illus., \$9.95. Collection of readings with commentary highlighting the fundamental changes in the study of developmental psychology in the past two decades.

DIRECTORY OF AMERICAN PHILOSOPHERS, Vol. IV, 1968-69—Archie J. Bahm, Ed.—Bahm (Albuquerque, N.M.), 1968, 439 p., \$13.95. Published biennially, lists all U.S. and Canadian colleges and their philosophy staffs, fellowships, employment opportunities, journals and societies, with index of 8,500 names.

DIRECTORY OF GOVERNMENT AGENCIES SAFEGUARDING CONSUMER AND ENVIRONMENT—Daniel Sprecher—Serina Press, 1968, 141 p., paper, \$4.95. Covers for the 50 states and D.C. the federal and/or state agencies and officials concerned with foods, drugs, meats, pesticides, fraud, pollution control, mail fraud, and alcoholic beverages.

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THE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF ETIQUETTE: A Guide to Good Manners in Today's World—Llewellyn Miller, introd. by Cleveland Amory—Crown Pubs., 1968, 640 p., illus., \$12.50. Arranged alphabetically, answers questions on correct manners for all occasions.

GEOPHYSICAL MEASUREMENTS: Techniques, Observational Schedules and Treatment of Data—C. M. Minnis, Ed.—M.I.T. Press, 1968, 398 p., illus., \$20. Volume 1 of the seven-volume ANNALS OF THE IQSY (1964-1965), reporting on studies of the normal steady-state properties of the sun and its effects on the earth while the disturbances caused by solar flares were at a minimum.

GULLIVER'S TROUBLES, OR THE SETTING OF AMERICAN FOREIGN POLICY—Stanley Hoffmann—McGraw-Hill, 1968, 556 p., \$11.95. A volume in the series ATLANTIC POLICY STUDIES, published for the Council on Foreign Relations. Deals realistically with the complexities facing U.S. foreign policy.

HANDBOOK OF SEMICONDUCTOR CIRCUITS—TAB Bks. 1968, 448 p., diagrams, \$7.95. Reprint of selected group of 124 transistor circuits with design and operational data, originally published for the Armed Forces Supply Support Center.

THE HARCOURT BRACE INTERMEDIATE DICTIONARY—Harrison Gray Platt, Ed.-in-Chief—Harcourt, 1968, 893 p., illus., \$7.50. Modern dictionary for boys and girls, with more than 46,000 entries in large type, color index and many illustrations.

HARVEST OF THE SEA—John Bardach—Harper, 1968, 301 p., photographs, \$6.95. On the advances in probing the depths of the oceans in search of new methods for harvesting their riches for man.

IDENTITY: Youth and Crisis—Erik H. Erikson—Norton, 1968, 336 p., paper, \$2.95. Psychoanalyst reevaluates his own theories of identity in the light of acute historical change during the two decades when the material on which this book is based was written.

INDIAN COSTUMES—Robert Hofsinde (Gray-Wolf)—Dorsey, 1968, 95 p., illus. by author, \$2.95. Describes selected examples of dress from ten representative tribes, for young readers.

INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM ON ENZY-MATIC ASPECTS OF METABOLIC REGULATION—M. P. Stulberg, Ed.—National Cancer Institute (GPO), 1967, 343 p., diagrams, \$3.25. Symposium held in Mexico City dealt with topics ranging from regulation of glycogen metabolism to RNA code words in several species.

INTRODUCTION TO STATISTICS—John M. Bevan—Philosophical Lib., 1968, 220 p., diagrams, \$6. Intended as an introduction to the methods of statistics for both the general reader and student, with emphasis on the basic ideas on which much of the procedure of statistics depends.

JOURNEYS IN SCIENCE: Small Steps, Great Strides—David L. Arm, Ed.—Univ. of New Mexico Press, 1967, 303 p., illus., \$5.95. Collection of articles, presented at 12th AFOSR Science Seminar, topics ranging from psycholinguistic approaches to communication to plasma confinement for fusion.

THE LIFE OF THE MOUNTAINS—Maurice Brooks—McGraw-Hill, 1968, 232 p., color photographs, drawings, \$4.95. Introduces young people and the general reader to the ecology of mountain parks, from the Appalachians to the Sierra Nevadas.

MANPOWER PLANNING FOR HIGH TALENT PERSONNEL—Eric W. Vetter—Bureau of Industrial Relations, U. of Mich., 1967, 222 p., \$8. Provides information on the nature of manpower planning, focusing on analytical approaches that can be used to study the manpower situation in a specific organization.

THE MASTER GAME: Pathways to Higher Consciousness Beyond the Drug Experience—Robert S. de Ropp—Delacorte Press, 1968, 252 p., \$5.95. In search of a "game worth playing" to sustain man's mental health and vigor, the author explores specific techniques known as creative psychology.

MATHEMATICAL HANDBOOK FOR SCIENTISTS AND ENGINEERS: Definitions, Theorems

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and Formulas for Reference and Review—Grano A. Korn and Theresa M. Korn—McGraw-Hill, 1968, 2nd rev. ed., 1130 p., diagrams, \$25. Completely new sections deal with z transforms, representation of rotations, mathematical programming, optimal control theory, random processes and decision theory.

MATRIX ANALYSIS OF INTERREGIONAL POPULATION GROWTH AND DISTRIBUTION—Andrei Rogers—Univ. of Calif. Press, 1968, 119 p., \$5. Focuses on a matrix approach to population analysis, examining its extended application to complex interregional demographic processes.

MONGOOSES: Their Natural History and Behaviour—H. E. Hinton and A. M. S. Dunn—Univ. of Calif. Press, 1967, 144 p., 16 photographs, drawings, \$6.50. An account of the natural history and biology of the species, their relations with poisonous animals, their methods of attack and nature of immunity, distribution, and kinds of mongooses.

THE NEW GROSSET WORLD ATLAS AND GAZETTEER—Grosset & Dunlap, 1967, 80 p., folded maps in color, 56 p. index, \$1.95. Covers 211 countries and areas on uncluttered maps, with tabulated information and 10,000 name index contained in compact pocket-size format.

NORMAL ADOLESCENCE: Its Dynamics and Impact—Formulated by the Committee on Adolescence, Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, Calvin F. Settlage, Chmn.—Scribner, 1968, 127 p., \$3.95. Deals with normal youth confronted not only with managing psychological development, but with the impact of explosions in population, knowledge, technology, communications and human aspirations.

A PLACE TO LIVE: The Crisis of the Cities—Wolf von Eckardt, foreword by August Heckscher—Delacorte Press, 1968, 430 p., 200 photographs, sketches, \$9.95. An architecture critic's essays on modern design, urban renewals and new towns, viewed with historical perspective and humanistic values in mind.

PLANTS ARE LIKE THAT—A. Harris Stone and Irving Leskowitz—Prentice-Hall, 1968, 64 p., illus. by Peter P. Plasencia, \$3.95. Simple ideas for boys and girls to discover for themselves how plants breathe, grow and react.
