ANIMAL VISION—George F. Mason—Morrow, 1968, 95 p., illus. by author, \$2.95. Discusses for young people human and animal vision, eye position, color, night and aquatic vision, and invertebrate eyes.

Peterson, \$4.95. Prepared during 20 years of field trips, this guide stresses the visual approach to identification. Capsule descriptions of 84 families bear symbols to help identify 1,300 species arranged in six color sections with descriptive text and diagnostic arrows pointing out distinctive features.

A major reference source to what is known about this useful laboratory animal. Includes stereotaxic atlas of the brain of the golden hamster and a master bibliography.

GROWTH REGULATING SUBSTANCES FOR ANIMAL CELLS IN CULTURE—Vittorio Defendi and Michael Stoker, Eds.—Wistar Institute Press, 1967, 125 p., illus., paper, \$5. A 1967 Wistar Institute Symposium discussing such topics as inhibition of cells by arginase, proximity effects of cell growth, and macrophage growth factor.

GUIDE TO PROGRAMS—National Science Foundation—GPO, 1968, 80 p., paper, 50 cents. Describes the Foundation's programs in support of scientific research, science education, institutional science, international science and science information information.

THE INSECURITY OF NATIONS: International Relations in the Twentieth Century—Charles Yost—Praeger, 1968, 276 p., \$6.50. Published for the Council on Foreign Relations, the author examines the underlying causes of national insecurity, the worldwide confrontations and responses between 1945-67, and possibilities for curbing confrontations between nations.

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
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
