COMMON BIRD SONGS

Professor Donald J. Borror

In a few hours you can acquire a knowledge of bird song that previous generations of bird lovers spent years accumulating. This 12-inch record (playable on all long-playing equipment) contains the calls and songs of 60 of America's most widely distributed birds, selected from a collection of thousands of recordings made in the field. These are the bird songs you are likely to hear on your field trips.

A bird song you know means instant identification!

Beginning with the familiar "caw" of the crow and progressing to the long, complex phrases of the mockingbird, the songs are arranged according to their character so that the listener can learn to distinguish between similar songs. More than one typical song is given for most birds. In some cases as many as 8 or 9 individuals of a single species are recorded. You become familiar with a wide range of typical song variations. This breadth of coverage is rare— even in bird-song records costing three times

With the record you get a 27-page, $8\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 booklet pointing out song characteristics, comparing similar songs, indicating rate of

songs per minute. The booklet also contains pictures of all 60 species, enabling you to coordinate songs with individual birds.

Use this record as an introduction to bird watching chance to test your knowledge at home . . . to refresh your memory before starting out on field trips. As a gift, as a record for yourself, this disc is invaluable to all bird watchers from beginners to ornithologists.
