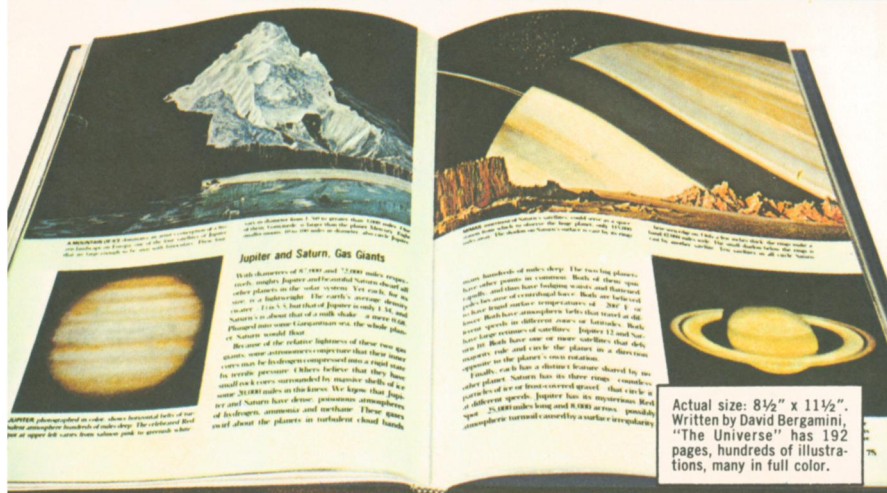

Jupiter and Saturn, Gas Giants

With diameters of 87,000 and 72,000 miles respectively, Jupiter and Saturn dwarf all other planets in the solar system. Yet each, for the most part, is a hydrogen ball. The earth's average density is one-tenth that of Jupiter and only 1/34 that of Saturn's. In other words, if you could blow up a balloon the size of the earth, it would weigh about as much as Jupiter. Saturn would float in water.

Because of the relative lightness of these two planets, some astronomers conjecture that their cores consist of hydrogen compressed into a solid state. In several passages, I have written that they have small rock cores surrounded by massive shells of hydrogen. Now we know that Jupiter and Saturn have dense, poisonous atmospheres of hydrogen, ammonia and methane. These atmospheres swirl about the planets in turbulent cloud bands.

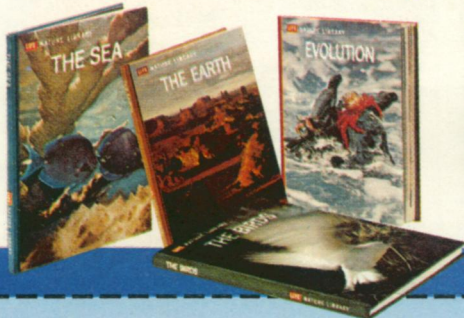

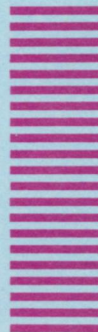
