Can you feel the windpipe's rings in your throat? Do you know why it is constructed that way? Are all your joints formed in the same way? Can you twist your knee in as many directions as your arm? Do you know what happens when you blink your eyes? How much does your liver weigh? your brain?

Discussing questions like these, this book takes your children on a learning adventure, showing how the important organs and systems of the human body are made and how they work. Not superficial or condescending, it keeps children's interest by encouraging them to play an active part; to look at their own legs and arms, joints, eyes and ears, eating habits, etc. Children are invited to note the pattern in the way hair grows by studying their own arm through a magnifying glass; to listen to the heart beat through a homemade stethoscope; to test their depth perception and binocular vision; to find the different taste areas on the tongue. With these simple experiments and by relating the material to such obvious, intriguing phenomena as coughing, dental cavities, blushing, broken bones, baldness, and so forth, the text makes a fascinating presentation of the eye and simple phenomena of vision, the ear and the nature of sound, the nose and tongue, the skeleton and muscle system, types of joints, the teeth, the digestive system, the heart and circulatory system, white and red blood cells, the brain and spinal cord, the gland system, male and female reproductive organs, phenomena of puberty, and reproduction, Illustrated with 100 drawings by William Krause. 93 pp. 64x s 94x.
