Drawing on the resources of the Scott Polar Research Institute, the book provides the general reader with fact-filled background information on the history of scientific investigations of the Antarctic recipions

THE ECOLOGICAL CONTEXT-John Mc-Hale—Braziller, 1970, 188 p., diagrams, \$7.95. Discusses and presents graphically the world consumption of common resources—food, energy, materials—and the ways in which this consumption affects environment.

EDUCATION IN CREATIVE ENGINEER-ING—Y. T. Li, Ed.— M.I.T. Press, 1970, 386 p., llus., paper, \$6.95. Symposium papers and workshop discussions of an experimental program designed to provide a creative engineering environment by bringing together students, faculty and engineers from the aerospace industry.

FOUR MINUTES TO LIFE—Ann Cutler, foreword by James R. Jude, M.D.—Cowles Bk. Co., 1970, 212 p., illus., \$5.95. Describes dramatic episodes of resuscitation in preventing death from heart failure, asphyxia, drowning, suffocation, lightning strokes and automobile accidents, such as that of the Russian theoretical physicist Landau.

GARDENS OF EUROPE: A Pictorial Tour—Dorothy Loa McFadden—Barnes, A. S., 1970, 198 p., 169 photographs (33 in color) by author and James L. McFadden, \$25. Description of gardens in 13 countries, arranged by type, with directions for visiting them.

A GUIDE TO THE BIRDS OF SOUTH AMERICA—Rodolphe Meyer de Schaunsee —Livingston Pub. Co., 1970, 470 p., 50 plates (most in color), drawings, maps, \$20. Brings together for the professional and

amateur ornithologist the essentials for the identification of nearly 3000 species of birds found in South America.

IMMUNOLOGICAL SURVEILLANCE-IMMUNOLOGICAL SURVEILLANCE—Sir Macfarlane Burnet—Pergamon Press, 1970, 280 p., diagrams, \$7.75. Written by Nobelist in "almost semi-popular form," the book presents an up-to-date account of the interaction of immune processes with malignant disease and in natural aging.

INFECTIONS AND IMMUNOSUPPRESSION IN SUBHUMAN PRIMATES—H. Balner and W. I. B. Beveridge, Eds.—Williams & Wilkins, 1970, 258 p., illus., \$21. Symposium papers deal with the medical use of subhuman primates, discussing simian viruses and bacterial infections, environmental and experimental conditions, and the hazards of immunosuppression.

INTRODUCTION TO STRUCTURALISM—Michael Lane, Ed.—Basic Bks., 1970, 456 p., diagrams, \$10. Displays a wide range of areas where the analytic methods of structuralism can be applied, from linguistics and semantics of style, mythical structure and fairy tales, to probing the legitimacy of Solomon and structure in mathematics.

METHODS IN MEDICAL RESEARCH, Vol. 12—R. E. Olson, Ed.—Year Bk. Medical Pubs., 1970, 440 p., illus., \$20. Describes the present state of the art and science of chromatography in adsorption chromatography, gas-liquid chromatography, ion-exchange, electrochromatography, and systems for separating and identifying a variety of compounds of biological interests.

THE METROPOLITAN ECONOMY: The THE METROPOLITAN ECONOMY: The Process of Employment Expansion—Thomas M. Stanback, Jr. and Richard V. Knight, foreword by Eli Ginzberg—Columbia Univ. Press, 1970, 279 p., tables, \$11.50. Pioneering study of the dynamics of employment expansion in the U.S., presents significant findings concerning local and regional differences, and the relation of size and type of city to different rates of growth.

MOLECULAR-GENETIC MECHANISMS OF DEVELOPMENT—Zhores A. Medvedev, transl. from Russian by Basil Haigh—Plenum Press, 1970, 418 p., illus., \$25. A comprehensive analysis of the molecular-genetic and biochemical aspects of development and differentiation of living organisms.

NORMAL AGING: Reports from the Duke Longitudinal Study, 1955-1969—Erdman Palmore, Ed.—Duke Univ. Press, 1970, 431 p., graphs, tables, \$17.50. Monograph assembles and summarizes the basic findings of an interdisciplinary investigation of the physical, mental and social processes of aging in a group of 256 normal community residents over age sixty.

SOCIAL ECONOMICS FOR THE 1970's George F. Rohrlich, Ed., foreword by Alvin H. Hansen—Dunellen Co., 1970, 189 p., \$9.95. A collection of probing articles concerning U.S. economic policy objectives and problem areas, proposing programs for health, manpower and social security.
