THE COCONUT: The Mother Tree. 16mm, color, sound, 18 min. Explains the cultivation and shows the many uses made of the tree, particularly in the South Pacific islands of Fiji and Tonga. The number of years required for the production of fruit as well as the life-span of the tree are explained, and the local nurseries which work to develop better stock are shown. The destructive forces which may attack the tree are also explained. The many uses for both the trunk and the fruit, both green and ripe, are demonstrated. Audience: elementary. Glaciers, which form when more snow falls than melts, are described in terms of their movement and their effects upon the surface of the earth. Mountain glaciers widen and deepen valleys and at high elevations form cirques and horns. Continental glaciers can dig depressions, remove soil, and smooth and fill uneven land. The families are isolated from market and transportation—and even from other families—so they have little access to industrial products. Their use of available forest materials to make their houses, clothing, tools and utensils illustrates their adaptation to a tropical environment. Audience: elementary, junor, senior high. The Choco Indians of Central and South America supply most of their own food by hunting, fishing, gathering and simple agriculture. Boys hunt and fish with their fathers; girls learn to gather and prepare food from their mothers. Surplus products are taken by canoe to the trading post several days journey away. 
