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**HUMAN FIGURE DRAWING IN ADOLESCENCE**—Mollie S. Schildkrout, I. Ronald Schenker and Marsha Sonnenblick—Brunner/Mazel, 1972, 152 p., 192 drawings, \$8.95. A team of child psychiatrist, pediatrician and psychologist working together in a medical clinic for adolescents, presents a selection of evaluated and classified adolescent drawings with interpreting clinical notes.

**THE HUMAN SPECIES: A Biology of Man**—S. A. Barnett—Harper, 1972, 333 p., 30 photographs, drawings, \$10. Considers the various branches of human biology in the light of the contributions each can make to contemporary problems—developmental biology, heredity, brain and behavior, human types, nutritional science, population and aging.

**INSTALLING & SERVICING ELECTRONIC PROTECTIVE SYSTEMS**—Harvey F. Swearer—TAB Bks., 1972, 256 p., photographs, diagrams, \$7.95; paper, \$4.95. Handbook deals with fire and theft security systems, from sensing and detecting devices through ultrasonic, microwave and vibration detectors, to proximity, audio and visual alarms.

**KOOKABURRAS**—Veronica A. Parry—Taplinger, 1972, 110 p., color plates, photographs, diagrams, \$6.50. A study of the Australian species, based on years of research and observation, describes social system, territory, vocal and visual behavior, breeding biology and other characteristics.

**MIGRANT IN THE CITY: The Life of a Puerto Rican Action Group**—Lloyd H. Rogler—Basic Bks., 1972, 251 p., \$8.95. Analysis of a Hispano action group in a middle-sized northeastern city, the group's conflicts, political organization and eventual limited achievements.

**MODERNIZATION: Latecomers and Survivors**—Marion J. Levy, Jr.—Basic Bks., 1972, 160 p., \$5.95. Political scientist looks at modernization in the abstract—a revolutionary social process universal in subverting established beliefs and institutions in both advanced and developing countries.

**THE NEW YORK TIMES EVERYDAY READER'S DICTIONARY OF MISUNDERSTOOD, MISUSED, MISPRONOUNCED WORDS**—Laurence Urdang, Ed.—Quadrangle Bks., 1972, 377 p., \$7.95. Includes words we know until somebody asks us what they mean; words we understand when we read them but not when we hear them (or vice versa); words we are unsure of using; words we can pronounce but not spell (or vice versa).

**NO FURTHER RETREAT: The Fight to Save Florida**—Raymond F. Dasmann—Macmillan, 1971, 244 p., photographs, drawings by Elizabeth Dasmann, maps, \$6.95. Concerned with the vegetation, land and animals of the only continental area of tropical life in the United States. Examines each region's uniqueness and resources and the efforts needed for its preservation.

**PEOPLE AND BUILDINGS**—Robert Gutman, Ed.—Basic Bks., 1972, 471 p., illus., tables, \$12.50. Collection of articles, essays and research monographs in the areas where behavioral sciences confront architecture, such as behavioral constraints on building design,

spatial organization and social interaction, environmental influences on well-being, and social meaning of architecture.

**RADIATION EFFECT AND TOLERANCE, NORMAL TISSUE: Basic Concepts in Radiation Pathology**—Jerome M. Vaeth, Ed.—Univ. Park Press, 1972, 526 p., micrographs, diagrams, \$29.50. Proceedings of the Sixth Annual San Francisco Cancer Symposium which attempted to correlate some of the more recently available laboratory and clinical information on radiation effect and tolerance with present day concepts of the time/dose relationship.

**SAN AGUSTIN: A Culture of Colombia**—Gerardo Reichel-Dolmatoff—Praeger, 1972, 163 p., color plates, 97 photographs, drawings, maps, \$12.50. Focuses on the archaeological finds of stone carvings in a remote region of the Colombian Andes.

**SOLID-STATE CIRCUIT TROUBLESHOOTING GUIDE**—Art Margolis—TAB Bks., 1972, 224 p., diagrams, \$7.95; paper \$4.95. Practical guide discusses various types of solid-state devices, describes how these devices work in typical circuits, and shows how to go about finding a faulty component.

**STRENGTHENING METHODS IN CRYSTALS**—A. Kelly and R. B. Nicholson, Eds.—Halsted Press (Wiley), 1972, 627 p., micrographs, diagrams, \$42.50. Reviews a number of the most important methods of increasing either the yield strength or the breaking strength of crystals, such as the solid solution hardening, strengthening by dispersed obstacles, and fine scale aggregates.

**THE SWANS**—Peter Scott and the Wildfowl Trust—Houghton, 1972, 242 p., 48 plates, photographs and drawings by author and others, maps, \$15. Comprehensive study of eight swan species, for layman as well as specialist, deals with every aspect of the subject, serves both as scientific reference and gives a vivid portrait of this group of majestic birds.

**ULTRAPURITY: Methods and Techniques**—Morris Zief and Robert Speights, Eds.—Dekker, 1972, 699 p., diagrams, tables, \$37.50. Reflects the advances in the preparation, handling, containment and analysis of ultrapure chemicals. Appended are information sources for ultrapurification, as well as significant analytical techniques.

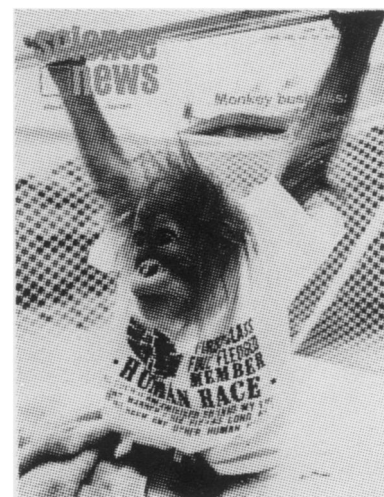
**VOCABULARY CONTROL FOR INFORMATION RETRIEVAL**—F. W. Lancaster—Information Resources Press, 1972, 233 p., diagrams, tables, \$17.50. Discusses full range of vocabulary control possibilities, from highly structured thesauri and classification schemes to natural-language (free-text) searching.

**THE WORLD WITHIN THE TIDE POOL**—Robert Silverberg—Weybright & Talley, 1972, 119 p., illus. by Bob Hines, \$6.95. Tells about the great variety of hardy organisms that live and thrive in strong little communities in nature's saltwater aquariums, in the innumerable tidepools along the temperate coastlines of the world.

**THE WORLD WITHIN THE OCEAN WAVE**—Robert Silverberg—Weybright & Talley, 1972, 114 p., illus. by Bob Hines, \$6.95. A book about the world of plankton, copepods, diatoms and jellyfish, portrays the living organisms and their interrelationships in the nutrient sea, and how man is dependent upon this world's seasonal rhythms.

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
