

MADNESS AND THE BRAIN-Solomon H. Snyder, M.D.—McGraw, 1974, 295 p., \$8.95. Describes what goes on in the brain of a severely disturbed person, the character of schizophrenic thinking and feeling, and how the various drugs of psychopharmacology af-

THE MEDICAL RUNAROUND-Andrew Malleson-Hart, 1974, 336 p., illus., \$7.95. Canadian doctor looks at the practice of medicine, fashions in treatment, overreported and underreported side effects of drugs, systems of health delivery, and presents his ideas on useful doctoring.

NATURE IN THE ROUND: A Guide to Environmental Science—Nigel Calder, Ed.— Viking Pr. 1974, 295 p., diagrams, \$8.95. Attempts comprehensive presentation of current knowledge about the environment and the role of traditional sciences in the new ecology, with specialists from various fields discussing inputs of expertise, and comprehensive model-making designed to cope with the complexity of issues, discussed by others.

ORIGINALITY AND COMPETITION IN SCI-ENCE: A Study of the British High Energy Physics Community—Jerry Gaston; foreword by John Ziman—U of Chicago Pr, 1973, 210 p., \$10.95. Using both quantitative data and information derived from 200 interviews, the study probes a dilemma of the modern research scientist-whether to work cooperatively or promote his own career by working in secret with a chance of original discovery.

THE ORIGINS OF LIFE ON THE EARTH-Stanley L. Miller and Leslie E. Orgel—P-H, 1974, 239 p., photographs, diagrams, \$10.95; paper, \$5.95. Interdisciplinary treatment of subject, attempts to reconstruct the chemical processes that occurred on the primitive earth and led to the appearance of the first living organisms.

RADAR, SONAR AND HOLOGRAPHY: An Introduction—Winston E. Kock—Academic Pr, 1973, 140 p., illus., \$9.50. Provides an introduction to the technology of radar and sonar, explains the fundamental principles of wave coherence, interference and diffraction, and the hologram process itself, making clear the basic difference between photography and holography, and between standard sonar and radar and the hologram version of these two technologies.

SOCIAL STRATIFICATION IN SCIENCE-Jonathan R. Cole and Stephen Cole—U of Chicago Pr. 1973, 283 p., tables, \$12.50. Sociological inquiry examines several aspects of a basic question: is the stratification of individuals in science based on the quality of scientific performance, or does discrimination obtain in the processes of status attainment?

SOLID STATE DOSIMETRY-Klaus Becker-CRC Press, 1973, 334 p., photographs, diagrams, \$39.95. Sourcebook on radiation effects and radiation dosimetry regarding thermoluminescence, stimulated excelectron emission, radiophotoluminescence, tracking etching, and various other systems.

A SOURCE BOOK IN CLASSICAL ANALY-SIS—Garrett Birkhoff, Ed., with Uta Merzbach
—Harvard U Pr. 1973, 470 p., \$25. Eighty
selections from the writings of the most influential mathematicians whose work shaped the structure of classical analysis in the 19th century.

SOVIETS IN SPACE—Peter L. Smolders, transl. from Dutch by Marian Powell; foreword by Patrick Moore—Taplinger, 1974, 285 p., color plates, photographs, drawings, \$9.95. Based on an intensive analysis of Soviet technical documents, this study presents an impartial and authoritative overview of Russian space programs and explorations.

STEREOCHEMISTRY AND BONDING IN IN-ORGANIC CHEMISTRY—J. E. Fergusson— P-H, 1974, 319 p., diagrams, \$15.95. Com-bines a semiquantitative discussion of theoretical stereochemistry with a systematic study of the stereochemistry of the elements, with emphasis on systems that involve the covalent bond.

SUPERCONDUCTING MAGNET SYSTEMS-H. Brechna-Springer-Verlag, 1973, 590 p., 396 diagrams, 46 tables, \$65.60. Systematically arranged, comprehensive treatment of the design and operation of superconducting magnets. Deals with cryogenic systems and properties of materials at low temperatures. and the basic theory of superconductivity.

THE TOP: Universal Toy, Enduring Pastime-D. W. Gould—Potter, 1973, 274 p., photographs, drawings, \$7.50. A copiously illustrated, comprehensive history of man's fascination with the spinning top, discusses its derivations and technical aspects.

UNGLAZED CHINA—J. Tuzo Wilson—Sat Rev Pr, 1973, 336 p., 36 photographs, \$9.95. Canadian geophysicist revisits China and Chinese scientists, and observes many striking changes since he first visited China in 1958, in connection with the IGY.

UPROOTING AND AFTER-Charles Zwingmann, and Maria Pfister-Amende-Springer Verlag, 1973, 370 p., diagrams, tables, \$22.50. Medico-sociological study, deals with the experiences of people, in a variety of countries, who have been displaced, put in concentra-tion camps, were tortured, migrated, reemigrated, and how they, as groups and as individuals, survived these ordeals.

UP-WINGERS—F. M. Esfandiary—Day, 1973, 146 p., \$5.95; paper, \$2.95. An optimistic manifesto on modern civilization, visualizes, beyond right- and left-wing philosophies, beyond present educational and industrial systems, the global application of space-age technology for the development of mankind.

WATER ATLAS OF THE UNITED STATES-James J. Geraghty and others-Water Info. Center., 1973, 200 p., 122 maps in color, \$35. Updated and expanded atlas contains completely new group of 33 maps devoted to the nation's water quality and pollution problems, from thermal pollution, DDT, sewage, to arsenic and lead, offshore disposal and fish kills.

THE WAY TO GO: The Coming Revival of U.S. Rail Passenger Service—Thomas C. U.S. Rail Passenger Service—Thomas C. Southerland, Jr. and William McCleery—S&S, 1974, 256 p., photographs, \$8.95. Takes an informative and optimistic look at the U.S. transportation future, discusses the existing technology, politics, needs and outlook.
