Handbook systematically presents the results of an intensive field study of the habits of some 59 species of ants, collected from 514 nest samples in the Deep Canyon Transect of Southern California.

ARK II: Social Response to Environmental Imperatives—Dennis C. Pirages and Paul R. Ehrlich—W H Freeman, 1974, 344 p., paper, \$3.95. Social scientist and biologist outline and place into social perspective many of the environmental problems that beset our society, offering both short- and long-run solutions.

BLUEPRINT FOR MEDICAL CARE-David D. Rutstein—MIT Pr, 1974, 284 p., \$8.95. Specialist in preventive medicine here details for the layman a systematic plan for building a sound and functional national medical care program, one in which all the components and modular units are joined into a single structure to provide better-quality and more efficient health care.

BLUE-COLLAR JOURNAL: A College President's Sabatical-John R. Coleman-Lippincott, 1974, 252 p., \$6.95. In a quest to vary the rhythm and viewpoint of his usual life style as president of Haverford College, the author describes his work and human contacts on three menial jobs he held in the spring of 1973— as ditchdigger, sandwich- and salad-man, and garbage collector.

CHILDREN'S DRAWINGS AS DIAGNOSTIC AIDS-Joseph H. Di Leo, M.D.-Brunner/Mazel, 1973, 227 p., drawings, \$12.50. Views children's drawings as a projective technique expressing internalized mental images. Text explores revealing deviations from the usual in drawings made by pre-school children in individual sessions under uniform conditions.

CIVILIZED MAN'S EIGHT DEADLY SINS— Konrad Lorenz, transl, from German by M. K. Wilson—HarBraceJ, 120 p., \$4.95. Essays written four years ago, at the height of the ethologist's concern with the various dangers contributing to a process of dehumanization.

COLOUR 73: Survey Lectures and Abstracts of Papers, 2nd Congress of the International Colour Association—Wiley, 1974, 566 p., dia-grams, tables, \$39.95. Reports on latest developments in color vision, color differences, colorimetry, reproduction of color, colorant formulation, whites, calculations and instruments.

COMETS—Russell Ash and Ian Grant—Bounty Bks (Crown), 1974, 48 p., photographs, drawings, \$3.95; paper, \$1.95. A collation of known facts about comets, their orbits, the history of observations, and various tabulated data.

GEMINI: The Psychology and Phenomena of Twins—Judy W. Hagedorn and Janet W. Kizziar—Droke Hse/Hallux, 1974, 138 p., \$7.95. Psychologists, identical twins themselves, discuss the special problems of twins, and analyze short case histories of troubled twins to focus on what promotes the emo-tional health of twins.

Systematic study of bioprogrammed creatures without backbones that have left a fossil trace. Links fossils to pertinent data from molecular biology, bio-geochemistry, information theory and ecology.

RAPA NUI: Easter Island—Fred Picker: historireser island—rrea ricker; historical summary by Thor Heyerdahl—Paddington Pr (Two Continents), 1974, 9x11, 134 p., photographs by author, \$14.95. Splendid visual presentation of the island, its landscape, prehistoric monuments, petroglyphs, and people.

THE SKINNER PRIMER: Behind Freedom and Dignity—Finley Carpenter—Free Pr, 1974, 300 p., \$7.95; paper, \$2.45. An appraisal of Skinner's thesis, provides a description and analysis of Skinner's psychology, examines the mul-tiple meanings of freedom and their relevance daily living, and concludes with possible alternative social organizations with special emphasis on Skinner's plan for cultural re-

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
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
