THE AMATEUR ASTRONOMER'S HANDBOOK—James Muirden—T. Y. Crowell, 1974, rev. expanded ed., 404 p., photographs, diagrams, tables, \$8.95. Up-to-date survey of the techniques of amateur astronomy, from selection of equipment to conduct of actual optical work, with major section discussing the solar system, stars and nebulae.

THE ARCHAEOLOGY OF SHIPS—Paul Johnstone—Walck, 1974, 135 p., color plates, photographs, drawings, maps, \$8.95. Tells about the discovery, lifting and restoration of such finds as the nearly 5,000 year-old Cheops ship, the Byzantine Yassi Ada, the Viking ships, and the Anglo-Saxon Sutton Hoo.

ASTROLOGY: Sense or Nonsense—Roy A. Gallant—Doubleday, 1974, 218 p., photographs, drawings, \$5.95. Popularly written, generously illustrated, sober examination of the methods and claims of astrology.

THE COLLECTOR'S ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SHELLS—S. Peter Dance, Ed.—McGraw, 1974, 288 p., 1,500 color photographs by Ian Cameron, drawings, \$19.95. Reference work to 2,000 species arranged in systematic order following up-to-date classification of mollusks. Photographs especially taken for this book are closely integrated with text.

THE COMPLETE ILLUSTRATED BOOK OF DYES FROM NATURAL SOURCES—Arnold and Connie Krochmal—Doubleday, 1974, 282 p., color plates, photographs, drawings, \$9.95. After short historical introduction, discusses dye plants, methods and supplies, and describes materials and methods for 220 dye recipes.

CONCEPTS IN ETHOLOGY: Animal and Human Behavior—M. W. Fox; foreword by René Dubos—U of Minn Pr, 1974, 156 p., photographs, drawings, \$8.50. Monograph presents studies of animal behavior, draws certain inferences to human behavior, points out the limits of analogy, and discusses application of ethology in animal husbandry.

CONTINENTS IN MOTION: The New Earth Debate—Walter Sullivan—McGraw, 1974, 413 p., color plates, photographs, diagrams, maps, \$17.95. Thoroughly documented, tells in layman's language of ocean bottom rifts and trenches, magnetic reversals, deep-sea drillings, plumes and eruptions, piecing together the great epic of continental plate tectonics.

CYCLES OF ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS: Benchmark Papers in Ecology—Lawrence R. Pomeroy, Ed. —DH & R, 1974, 388 p., diagrams, tables, \$22. These classic studies on the cycling of mineral nutrients focus on the foundations of modern ecology, control mechanisms, compartmental analysis, and mathematical models.

DOCTOR IN THE ZOO—Bruce Buchenholz; introd. by Cleveland Amory—Viking Pr, 1974, 192 p., photographs by author, \$19.95. Collection of appealing photographs brings the reader into intimate contact with assorted zoo animals receiving expert veterinarian care.

EARLY DETECTION: Breast Cancer is Curable—Philip Strax, M.D.—Har-Row, 1974, 105 p., photographs, \$5.95. Informative and persuasive professional advice to women. Proceeds from book go to American Cancer Society.

THE ENVIRONMENT: Costs, Conflicts, Action—John Cairns, Jr. and Kenneth L. Dickson, Eds.—Dekker, 1974, 162 p., diagrams, tables, \$12.75. Conference papers explore the reasons for the complexity of viewpoints about environmental issues, from resource demands and predictions to environmental action by government and industry.

EUREKA: An Illustrated History of Inventions from the Wheel to the Computer—Edward de Bono, Ed.—HR & W, 1974, 10 x 12, 248 p., photographs, many in color, drawings, tables, \$25. Explains hundreds of key inventions, while summary articles introduce each field of human endeavor, from means of transportation to mental aids. Includes chronological tables of contemporary events.

HEREDITY AND YOU: How You Can Protect Your Family's Future—Augusta Greenblatt, foreword by Leon E. Rosenberg, M.D.—Coward, 1974, 256 p., \$7.95. Exceptionally lucid and readable, describes the biological basis of selected genetic disorders, focusing in particular on those for which concrete help is available now.

HOW MUSICAL IS MAN?—John Blacking—U of Wash Pr, 1974, 130 p., photographs by author, musical examples, \$6.95; paper, \$2.95. Ethnomusicologist-anthropologist explores the role of music in society and culture, drawing examples from Western music and from the music of the Transvaal Venda people.

THE HUMAN MIRROR: Material and Spatial Images of Man—Miles Richardson, Ed.—La State U Pr, 1974, 390 p., photographs, diagrams, maps, \$15. Essays cover a broad range of inferential studies that focus on such material objects and images as Neanderthal graves, Teotihuacan murals, beam presses on Korfu, and adaptations to spatial crowding in Taos Pueblo.

THE INVISIBLE UNIVERSE: The Story of Radio Astronomy—Gerrit L. Verschuur—Springer Verlag, 1974, 188 p., photographs, diagrams, paper, \$5.90. Describes for the layman the world of the radio astronomer, the discoveries made during the last decade, and how they have expanded our knowledge of the universe.

LAUE ATLAS: Plotted Laue Back-Reflection Patterns of the Elements, the Compounds RX and RX:—Edward Preuss, Bernard Krahl-Urban and Rainer Butz—Halstead Pr. 1974, 432 p., illus., \$49.50. Presents a simplified method for the orientation of single crystals based on direct comparison of Laue patterns with Laue diagrams plotted by computer.

THE LIFE OF BIRDS, Vols. I and II—Jean Dorst, transl. from French by I. C. J. Galbraith—Columbia U Pr, 718 p., 32 plates, drawings, \$35. A major study of the biology of birds giving special attention to the adaptation of birds to the requirements of flight, and adjustment to different environments.

MANIPULATION: Dangers and Benefits of Brain Research—Erwin Lausch, transl. from German by Oliver Coburn—Viking Pr, 1974, 283 p., illus., \$8.95. Gives an overview and summarizes experimental findings in a wide variety of areas investigated.

THE MEDICINE SHOW—The Editors of Consumer Reports—Pantheon, 1974, rev. ed., 384 p., \$8.50; paper, \$3.50. Updated advice to help the consumer make better choices among brand-name recommendations, advertised cold remedies, pain-killers, antacids, deodorants, and other drugs and cosmetics.

MIND IN THE WATERS: A Book to Celebrate the Consciousness of Whales and Dolphins—Joan McIntyre, Ed.—Scribner/Sierra Club, 1974, 9 x 11, 240 p., color plates, photographs, drawings, \$14.95. A tribute to cetacean intelligence,

brings together myths, brain research, observations, and experiments in communication with individuals and groups of whales and dolphins.

THE NORTHMEN—Thomas Froncek and Editors of Time-Life Books—Time-Life Bks, 1974, 160 p., color plates, photographs, map, \$7.95. Presents in pictures and readable text the extraordinary record of Scandinavian prehistory preserved in bogs, from Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages, in amber, gold and silver.

THE PASSAIC RIVER: Past, Present, Future—Norman F. Brydon—Rutgers U Pr, 1974, 395 p., photographs, maps, \$15. New Jersey river in historical perspective, from dinosaur fossil finds, and early settlement, to impact of industrialization, pollution and wildlife preserves.

PRACTICAL CIRCUIT DESIGN for the Experimenter—Don Tuite—TAB Bks, 1974, 191 p., diagrams, \$8.95; paper, \$4.95. Written for the electronics hobbyist interested in a more analytical explanation of electrical devices.

THE PRIVATE LIFE OF THE RABBIT: An Account of the Life History and Social Behavior of the Wild Rabbit—R. M. Lockley, introd. by Richard Adams—Macmillan, 1974 (1964), 152 p., plates, drawings, \$6.95. Biologist's account of his study of a controlled rabbit colony observed in Wales, the scientific basis for the events in Adams' WATERSHIP DOWN.

SCIENCE AND CIVILIZATION IN CHINA, Vol. 5: Chemistry and Chemical Technology, Part II: Spagyrical Discovery and Invention: Magisteries of Gold and Immortality—Joseph Needham with Lu Gwei-Djen—Cambridge U Pr, 1974, 542 p., plates, illus., \$35. Covers the subject of alchemy and early chemistry and metallurgy, and the physiological verifications of the efficacy of elixirs and perpetual conservation of bodies.

SWANS OF THE WORLD—Sylvia Bruce Wilmore—Taplinger, 1974, 230 p., 8 plates, drawings by author, \$9.95. Well-illustrated account of swans' habits, movements and behavior, Mute, Trumpeter, Whooper, Whistling Swan and Bewick's, as well as the southern Black, Blacknecked, and Cororoba Swan.

SYNTHETIC PRODUCTION AND UTILIZATION OF AMINO ACIDS—Takeo Kaneko et al, Eds.—Halsted Pr, 1974, 312 p., \$22.50. Outlines the known procedures for chemical synthesis, covers synthetic methods for individual amino acids, and deals with their utilization in food, animal feeds, medicines and cosmetics.

THE TREATMENT OF BREAST CANCER—Sir Hedley Atkins, Ed.—Univ. Park, 1974, 222 p., \$19.50. Critical and up-to-date review of the main techniques of treatment, surgery, radiotherapy, endocrine therapy, hormonal therapy, and chemotherapy.

UFO's: A Scientific Debate—Carl Sagan and Thornton Page, Eds.—Norton, 1974, 310 p., illus., paper, \$3.95. Reprint (1972) of papers presented at AAAS Symposium.

WHITNEY'S STAR FINDER: A Field Guide to the Heavens—Charles A. Whitney—Knopf, 1974, 122 p., diagrams, tables, locator wheel, paper, \$4.95. Observer's concise, informative manual, explains clearly and helps identify what can be seen and when over North America, with naked eye and binoculars.
