Topics include the emergence of plate tectonics, the origin of birds, energetic particles and the lunar surface, array seismology, creep of rock, and metallogenesis of oceanic spreading centers.

THE BARBARA KRAUS DICTIONARY OF PROTEIN: Over 8,000 Brand Names and Basic Foods with Their Protein (and Caloric) Count—Barbara Kraus—Harper Mag Pr, 1975, 344 p., tables, \$8.95. Alphabetically arranged, per-pound and single-portion composition tables for both foods and beverages, USDA and brand names.

THE BRAIN BANK OF AMERICA: An Inquiry into the Politics of Science—Philip M. Boffey, introd. by Ralph Nader—McGraw, 1975, 335 p., \$10.95. Examines the influence of corporate, political and other special interests on the National Academy of Sciences. Evaluates the recommendations by prestigious Acad-emy committees on important national issues of controversial nature.

THE COMPLETE FM 2-WAY RADIO HAND-BOOK—Clayton L. Hallmark—TAB Bks, 1975, 295 p., illus., \$9.95; paper, \$6.95. Practical guide covers both servicing and operation of transmitters and receivers for police radio, taxicab, boaters' radio, amateur radio and citizen's band.

ETHNIC VARIABLES IN HUMAN FACTORS ENGINEERING—Alphonse Chapanis, Ed.—Johns Hopkins Pr, 1975, 290 p., photographs, diagrams, tables, \$17.50. Based on symposium papers, book brings together data on national and cultural variables in the field of purpositions that the study of burgan charge. ergonomics, the study of human charac-teristics, capacities and limitations as they apply to the design of machines, living spaces and environment.

INTERSTELLAR CONTACT—Duncan Lunan—Regnery, 1975, 324 p., illus., \$9.95. Well-versed in the technologies of astronautics, the author speculates on the feasibility of interstellar travel and communication, the possibility of contact with a civilization in space, and colonization of other planets.

Supplies detailed technical information based on U.S. patents relating to the chemistry and practical preparation of liquid crystals. Covers cholesteric compounds, applications for cholesteric crystals, nematic compounds, and nematic and smectic liquid crystal display systems and

Vulcanolo-gist explains in layman's language the nature and significance of erupting gases which are the driving force of volcanic activity, and the tectonics of volcanic regions and submarine volcanoes.

MARTIN GARDNER'S SIXTH BOOK OF MATHEMATICAL GAMES from SCIENTIFIC AMERICAN—Martin Gardner—Scribner, 1975, 262 p., 183 diagrams, paper, \$5.95. Contains puzzles concerned with the helix, Klein bottles, combinational theory, parity backer that the ground the moon magic tricks checks, the trip around the moon, magic tricks, and infinite regress.

Tells of actual experiences of small farmers who grow crops the organic way, with sewage sludge, animal and green manure, and try to control woods and buse without experiences. control weeds and bugs without chemical

THE ORIGIN OF THE IDEA OF CHANCE IN CHILDREN—Jean Piaget and Barbel Inhelder, transl. from French—Norton, 1975, 270 p., illus., \$12.50. Examines experimentally the formation of the physical aspects of the notion of chance, the quantification of probabilities, and the development of operations of combination and arrangement.

**THE PEOPLE OF AFRICA**—Jean Hiernaux—Scribner, 1975, 230 p., photographs, maps, \$12.50; paper, \$4.95. Anthropological study of the biological history of the indig-enous African populations and ethnic groups, their diversity explained in terms of the influences of the environment, climate, and cultural processes such as migration and sexual se-

PHARMACOTHERAPY AND PSYCHO-THERAPY: Paradoxes, Problems and Progress—Committee on Research, GAP— Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, 1975, 176 p., paper, \$6. Investigates critically the use of psychoactive drugs by mental health therapists and what is actually known about their effectiveness.

A PSYCHIATRIC GLOSSARY: The Meaning of Terms Frequently Used in Psychiatry—Shervert H. Frazier, M.D. et al—Am Psychiatric Assn, 1975, 4th ed., 156 p., paper, \$3. Explanation of terms intended to foster better understanding of mental disorders, contains A-Z glossary, and tables of psychoactive drugs, legal terms, psychological tests, and sleep disorders.

**PSYCHOLOGY OF THE MEXICAN:** Culture and Personality—R. Diaz-Guerrero—U of Tex Pr, 1975, 192 p., tables, \$10.95. Collection of essays based on studies of Mexican psychology, both as an independent phenomenon, and in cross-cultural comparisons of Mexicans, Mexican-Americans and Anglo-Americans

TRITIUM AND ITS COMPOUNDS-E. Anthony Evans—Halsted Pr, 1975, 2nd ed., 837 p., illus., tables, \$55. Provides research workers with an informative critical review of progress in the field of tritium tracers. New emphasis is placed on the synthesis of tritium-labelled compounds, and a whole chapter deals with precautions in handling tritium.

THE WORLD OF THE PAST, Vols. 1 and 2—Jacquetta Hawkes, Ed.—S&S, 1975, 612 p., 719 p., plates, maps, paper, \$5.95 each. Anthology with editor's introductions, presents the history of archaeology in the words of the original discoverers. Vol. 1 covers the Stone Ages, Mesopotamia, Babylon and Egypt, vol. 2, Europe, Asia and the Western Hemisphere.
