**ALCOHOLISM**—Alvin and Virginia Silverstein, introd. by Gail Gleason Milgram—Lippincott, 1975, 128 p., \$5.50; paper, \$2.25. A clear and comprehensive outline of the medical facts about drinking.

**ALL THE STRANGE HOURS**: The Excavation of a Life—Loren Eiseley—Scribner, 1975, 273 p., illus. by Emanuel Haller, \$9.95. Autobiography of naturalist-anthropologist whose exceptionally literary prose brings alive his formative adventurous years as well as his philosophy of scientist and humanist.

**AUSTRALIAN LANDFORMS**—Carolyn R. Stone—David & Charles, 1975, 80 p., color and b&w photographs, diagrams by Derrick I. Stone, \$9.95. Depicts and describes the internal and external forces shaping the crust of the island continent, and discusses mountain, coastal, arid, and limestone landforms.

**BETTER GIVING**: The New Needs of American Philanthropy—George G. Kirstein—HM, 1975, 214 p., tables, \$7.95. Annotated, objective assessment of the ways in which the 25 billion U.S. philanthropic dollars are raised; tries to present a practical survey of the many legitimate but confusing appeals that confront the giver.

**THE CRISIS OF RESPONSIBILITY**: Man as the Source of Accountability—William Horosz—U of Okla Pr, 1975, 340 p., \$12.50. Offers a diagnosis of the crisis of modern mass society, a partial solution for transcending it, and explores the fate of responsibility in humanistic psychology.

**CRUCIAL EXPERIMENTS IN MODERN PHYSICS**—George L. Trigg—Crane-Russak, 1985, 150 p., diagrams, paper, \$4.95. Describes individual works whose decisive experimental results were ground-breaking in establishing the concepts of modern physics.

**THE DARK NIGHT SKY**: A Personal Adventure in Cosmology—Donald D. Clayton, foreword by Fred Hoyle—Quadrangle, 1975, 218 p., photographs, \$9.95. Research scientist in nuclear astrophysics shares with the layman his insights into the structure of the universe, its past and future, and conveys some of the excitement of scientific search and fellowship with other scientists.

**THE DICTIONARY OF BUTTERFLIES AND MOTHS in Color**—Allan Watson and Paul E. S. Whalley; introd. by W. Donald Duckworth—McGraw, 1975, 10x12, 296 p., 405 color plates, \$29.95 till 5/31/76; \$39.95 thereafter. Gives complete data on all the butterflies and moths throughout the world in an easily referred to alphabetical format.

**EXCAVATIONS AND RECONNAISSANCE**: The Prehistory of the Tehuacan Valley, Vol. 5—Richard S. MacNeish et al—U of Tex Pr, 1975, 9x11, 529 p., photographs, maps, charts, tables, \$29.50. Compilation in terms of contextual studies of all the artifacts and ecofacts uncovered over a ten-year period, including preliminary analysis of how and why one cultural system evolved into another.

**FIDDLER CRABS OF THE WORLD** (Ocypodidae: genus *Uca*)—Jocelyn Crane—Princeton U Pr, 1975, 9x11, 736 p., photographs, tables, \$75. Monumental work brings together results from both field and laboratory; survey emphasizes the relation of striking form to complex behavior; systematic revision and proposed phylogeny is based on morphological comparisons aided by evidence of social behavior, biogeography and ecology.

**THE FOOD IN YOUR FUTURE**: Steps to Abundance—Keith C. Barrons—Von Nos Reinhold, 1975, 192 p., photographs, diagrams, \$7.95. Agriculturist discusses the economic aspects of farm productivity based on the best agricultural practices, augmenting protein supplies, the outlook for improved agricultural technology, energy and storage problems.

**THE FOREST SERVICE**: A Study in Public Land Management—Glen O. Robinson—Johns Hopkins U Pr, 1975, 352 p., tables, \$16.95; paper, \$4.95. Traces the agency's history from 1876 to the present, provides an understanding of both the service and the administrative problems.

**GRANTS**: How to Find Out About Them and What to Do Next—Virginia P. White—Plenum Pr, 1975, 368 p., \$19.50. A basic guide for the grant-seeking researcher, helps identify the organization most likely to be interested in his proposal, and fully describes the application process.

**LIVING WITH CANCER**—Ernest H. Rosenbaum, M.D.—Praeger, 1975, 214 p., \$10. Practicing oncologist discusses therapy of terminal cancer and shows in 11 case histories how diverse personalities have dealt with the emotional problem of living with cancer.
