THE COMPLETE BOOK OF KITES AND KITE FLYING—Will Yolen—S&S, 1976, 9x11, 256 p., photographs, drawings, \$9.95. International authority on kite flying covers every aspect of this age-old, world-wide outdoor pastime, the skills involved, tips on construction; includes contest, organizational, source materials and records data.

DANGEROUS SEA CREATURES: A Complete Guide to Hazardous Marine Life—

Thomas Helm—Funk & W, 1976, 288 p., 85 photographs, drawings, \$9.95; paper, \$4.95. Authoritative information, combines research and personal observations, dispels unfounded fears, identifies and discusses toxic and nontoxic hazards, tells how to prevent accidents and apply first aid.

THE FORMATION OF THE AMERICAN SCIENTIFIC COMMUNITY: The American Association for the Advancement of Science, 1848-60—Sally Gregory Kohlstedt—U of III Pr, 1976, 277 p., appendix, \$10.95. Systematic analytical study of the major role played by the AAAS during a dynamic era of American intellectual and scientific development.

THE HEALER'S ART: A New Approach to the Doctor-Patient Relationship—Eric J. Cassell, M.D.—Lippincott, 1976, 240 p., \$8.95. Deals with the art of medicine, emphasizes the difference between curing the disease and healing the patient by making him an ally in the healing process.

IMMUNITY: How Our Bodies Resist Disease—Joan Arehart-Treichel—Holiday, 1976, 160 p., photographs, drawings, \$5.95. Addressing the young adult, book tells what research has discovered about the immune system, B and T cells, embryos and antibodies, macrophages, transfer factor, organ transplants, and viral vaccines.

INTERFACIAL PHENOMENA IN METALS AND ALLOYS—Lawrence E. Murr, foreword by Morris Cohen—A-W, 1976, 390 p., photographs, diagrams, tables, \$24.40; paper, \$14.50. Reference work as well as text, discusses many new concepts of interfacial structure and properties.

THE LIFE OF THE SELF: Toward a New Psychology—Robert Jay Lifton—S&S, 1976, 190 p., \$7.95. Provides a systematic critique and integration of various post-Freudian insights; stresses continuity as a formative principle, and portrays the self as constantly capable of renewal.

THE LIVES OF BATS—D. W. Yalden and P. A. Morris—Quadrangle, 1976, 247 p., photographs, drawings, tables, \$9.95. The only mammals capable of sustained flight and unrivaled masters of echolocation, the bat genera comprise more than 800 species of great variety in physiology and habits. This book incorporates a wealth of new findings about these nocturnal animals.

MAN IN AFRICA—Colin M. Turnbull—Anchor/Doubleday, 1976, 333 p., drawings by John Morris, \$7.95. Anthropologist describes the development of the cultures of Africa from Cairo to the Cape of Good Hope; people of the grasslands, river valleys, forests and deserts; their cults and religions, crafts and witchcraft, music, political hierarchy and slavery.

MODERN HOME DICTIONARY OF MEDICAL WORDS—Morris Fishbein, M.D.—Doubleday, 267 p., paper, \$1.95. Clear definitions of medical terms, from abasia to zymosis; describes uses and standards of commonly made tests; explains the routine tests of a complete physical examination.

MONKEYS WITHOUT TAILS—John Napier—Taplinger, 1976, 120 p., color plates, b&w photographs, diagrams, \$16.95. A highly readable, lucid overview of what is now known of the evolution and life history of two primates—the ape and man.

PICTURE PROCESSING AND RECONSTRUCTION—Sheldon S. Sandler—Lexington Bks, 1976, 180 p., photographs, diagrams, \$18.95. Introduces the reader, in particular the electrical engineering student, to some of the basic ideas involved in using pictures for structural analysis.

PLAYING WITH INFINITY: Mathematical Explorations and Excursions—Rósza Péter, transl. from Hungarian by Z. P. Dienes—Dover, 1976, 280 p., illus., paper, \$3. Unabridged republication of 1961 English edition, presents concepts of mathematics not for mathematicians but for intellectually curious people in literature, the arts and humanities.

THE THINKING COMPUTER: Mind Inside Matter—Bertram Raphael—W H Freeman, 1976, 335 p., photographs, diagrams, \$12.95; paper, \$6.95. Presents in simple terms some of the most interesting and novel capabilities of computers, with focus on goals, current approaches and difficulties. While addressed to serious student, assumes no more than good high-school mathematics.

VISION IN THE ANIMAL WORLD—R. H. Smythe—St Martin, 1975, 175 p., drawings, \$18.95. Veterinary ophthalmologist describes in nontechnical language the mammalian eye and the eyesight of specific mammals, birds, aquatic animals, insects, spiders, and miscellaneous special peculiarities.

VULNERABILITY, COPING AND GROWTH: From Infancy to Adolescence—Lois Barclay Murphy and Alice E. Moriarty—Yale U Pr, 1976, 483 p., \$20. Emphasizes the positive strengths of children as resilient, dynamically changing individuals. Based on research carried out at the Menninger Foundation, the authors describe the ways in which children attempt to deal with stress.



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
