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CHARLES DARWIN—John Chancellor— Taplinger, 1976, 231 p., 222 color and b&w photographs, \$13.95. This thoughtful anecdotal biography gives a fascinating account of the many theories and controversies that have been surrounding Darwin's work.

CHEETAH UNDER THE SUN—Nan Wrogemann—McGraw, 1976, 172 p., color plates, b&w photographs, drawings, maps, tables, \$14.95. A handsomely presented, comprehensive study of the genus *Acinonyx*, its association with man, geographic distribution, social structure, predatory habits.

EPIDEMICS—Geoffrey Mark and William K. Beatty—Scribner, 335 p., photographs, \$9.95. Tells the story of the role of epidemic diseases in the history of mankind by weaving together scientific evidence with eyewitness reports.

EVERYDAY INVENTIONS—Meredith Hooper—Taplinger, 1976, 128 p., photographs, drawings, \$7.95. Engagingly presented, factorammed descriptions of 32 inventions, ranging from wheelbarrow and nails to zipper and ball-point pen.

THE HEREDITY FACTOR: Genes, Chromosomes and You—William L. Nyhan with Edward Edelson—G&D, 1976, 320 p., photographs, diagrams, \$12.95. Geneticist introduces layman to the science of medical genetics, tells how genes and chromosomes work in heredity and hereditary diseases, and how prenatal medical techniques can help to avoid genetic tragedies.

IMMUNOLOGY: Readings from SCIENTIFIC AMERICAN—Introd. and additional material by F. M. Burnet—W H Freeman, 1976, 285 p., photographs, diagrams, \$14; paper, \$7. Articles deal with the homeostatic and self-monitoring immune system, and with immunity in relation to medicine.

PLAGUES AND PEOPLES—William H. Mc-Neill—Anchor/Doubleday, 1976, 377 p., \$10. Historian describes the dramatic impact of the infectious diseases on the rise and fall of civilizations.

THE REPRODUCTION OF COLOUR—R.W.G. Hunt—Halsted Pr, 1976, 3rd ed., 635 p., color plates, diagrams, tables, \$25. New topics covered include: recent research on tone and color reproduction, image structure of color photography, video-cassettes in color TV, and transparency duplication.

SEX, AGE, AND WORK: The Changing Composition of the Labor Force—Juanita Kreps and Robert Clark—Johns Hopkins U Pr,

1976, 95 p., tables, \$7.50; paper \$2.65. Study of work-life changes of married men and women, one-adult families, and implications of the new work patterns.

SIGHTS AND SOUNDS: The Very Special Senses—Charles E. Kupchella—Bobbs, 1976, 263 p., diagrams, paper, \$4.95. Written with the layman in mind, book presents the basic principles of sensory physiology, answering questions about the technical aspects of eye, ear and related nerve function.

STUTTERING SOLVED—Martin F. Schwartz—Lippincott, 1976, 186 p., diagrams, \$7.95. Deals with the stutterer's basic psychological stresses, describes the actual *physical* mechanism that triggers stuttering, and explains the airflow technique and therapy that successfully treats the "conditioned laryngospasm."

SUPER SKIN: The Doctor's Guide to a Beautiful, Healthy Complexion—Jonathan Zizmor, M.D. and John Foreman—T Y Crowell, 1976, 190 p., \$7.95. Practicing dermatologist discusses the whole range of skin care.

TOWARD A NEW PSYCHOLOGY OF WOMEN—Jean Baker Miller—Beacon Pr, 1976, 155 p., \$9.95. Practicing psychoanalyst examines traditionally defined masculine and feminine characteristics, and proposes a new framework in which such concepts as strength, weakness, dependency, autonomy, emotion, success, and power begin to take on new meaning and values.

ZERO GROWTH?—Alfred Sauvy—Praeger, 1976, 266 p., tables, \$9.95. Indicates the principal known data concerning the threat of population growth to man and nature.



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
