THE CONSTANT PEST: A Short History of Pests and Their Control—George Ordish—Scribner, 1976, 250 p., 13 plates, drawings, \$12.95. Economic entomologist traces the history of crop pests and methods of their control from ancient times through the rise of scientific methods, to pesticides as a panacea, the publication of *Silent Spring*, to the search for a greater understanding of the problem.

DICTIONARY OF PRONUNCIATION—Abraham and Betty Lass—Quadrangle, 1976, 334 p., \$12.50. A guide to 8,000 commonly mispronounced words. Indicates preferred and acceptable pronunciations according to four widely used dictionaries.

EXPERIMENTATION IN BIOLOGY: An Introduction to Design and Analysis—W. J. Ridgman—Halsted Pr, 1976, 242 p., tables, paper, \$11.75. Deals on the advanced level with the subject of biometry, covering a wide range of sophisticated methods, entirely from the biologists' point of view.

FISHES OF THE WORLD—Joseph S. Nelson—Wiley-Interscience, 1976, 430 p., drawings, maps, \$24. Presents systematic modern treatment of all major fish groups in linear order to reflect their evolutionary relationships.

Cites alternate recognized schemes of classification; includes checklist, distribution maps and bibliography.

THE GARDENER'S GUIDE TO BETTER SOIL—Gene Logsdon and Eds. of Organic Gardening and Farming—Rodale Pr, 1976, 256 p., photographs, drawings, tables, \$7.95. Written by experienced gardener, discusses successful techniques for testing the soil, fertilizing and conditioning, mulching, composting, draining and irrigating the garden.

THE GENERATION OF ELECTRICITY BY WIND POWER—E. W. Goldin and R. I. Harris—Halsted Pr, 1976, rev. ed., 350 p., plates, diagrams, tables, \$19. Reprint (1955) of essential reference on wind-power research, extended to include subsequent research and technical developments.

GLOSSARY OF CHEMICAL TERMS—Clifford A. Hampel and Gessner G. Hawley, Eds.—Van Nos Reinhold, 1976, 287 p., \$14.95. From *adherent* to *zymase* the glossary contains full definitions of 2,000 entries covering terms used in several subdivisions of chemistry and the chemical industry, including 100 biographical entries.

A GOOD AGE—Alex Comfort—Crown, 1976, 224 p., illus. by Michael Leonard, \$9.95. Gerontological findings and discussions, alphabetically arranged under headings from Agism, Alcohol, and Arthritis to Vitamins, Wrinkles, and Youth; written in the clear and engaging style of the well-known author-gerontologist.

THE LOGIC OF LIFE: A History of Heredity—François Jacob, transl. from French by Betty E. Spillman—Vintage/Random, 1976, 356 p., paper, \$3.95. Reprint (1973), conveys man's changing ideas about heredity.
