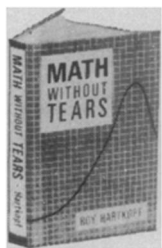

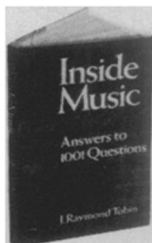

**COSMOLOGY NOW**—Laurie John, Ed., introd. by Sir Bernard Lovell—Taplinger, 1976, 168 p., photographs, drawings, \$10.95. A group of theorists here present the best descriptions of the universe which can be given today.

Fundamental contributions to such concepts as cause and effect in biological thought, the diversity of living forms and the unity of evolutionary processes, and analysis of the species concept.

**JUPITER:** Studies of the Interior, Atmosphere, Magnetosphere and Satellites—Tom Gehrels, Ed. with Mildred Shapley Matthews—U of Ariz Pr, 1976, 1,254 p., photographs, diagrams, tables, \$38.50. Specialists in their field cover all the scientific aspects of the planet.

**THE NUCLEAR POWER CONTROVERSY**—Arthur W. Murray, Ed.—P-H, 1976, 188 p., diagrams, tables, \$9.95; paper, \$3.95. Seven authorities from the fields of atomic energy, economics, science, law and technology offer information on key aspects of the current nuclear energy debate.

**ROGER TORY PETERSON'S DOZEN BIRDING HOT SPOTS**—George H. Harrison—S&S, 1976, 288 p., color plates, photographs, maps, \$9.95. Richly illustrated guide describes birdlife at 12 select areas, from Everglades to Tule-Klamath Refuges at Oregon border, with tips for visiting bird watchers.

**A SCIENTIST AT THE WHITE HOUSE:** The Private Diary of President Eisenhower's Special Assistant for Science and Technology—George B. Kistiakowsky, introd. by Charles S. Maier—Harvard U Pr, 1976, 515 p., photographs, \$15. Day-by-day journal entries with explanatory notes cover period from July 15, 1959 to November 15, 1960. Extensive introductory remarks set the diary clearly in the context of its epoch.

**THE SPACEFLIGHT REVOLUTION:** A Sociological Study—William Sims Bainbridge—Wiley-Interscience, 1976, 304 p., tables, \$15.95. Against a background of the history of astronautics and rocketry—German, American, Russian and British—the author presents his social scientific analysis of why and how the spaceflight revolution started, and how it succeeded.

**VITAMIN C, THE COMMON COLD AND THE FLU**—Linus Pauling—W H Freeman, 1976, 230 p., tables, \$8.95; paper, \$3.45. Expanded edition describes new research findings published since the controversial publication six years ago, with added chapters about protection against flu epidemic.

**THE WORLD OF SPIDERS**—W. S. Britton—Collins (Taplinger), 320 p., color and b&w plates, 232 drawings by Arthur Smith, \$17.50. Authoritative and detailed account of the successful evolutionary development of spiders, from early Devonian epoch to now.

**THE WORLD OF THE BAT**—Charles E. Mohr—Lippincott, 1976, 162 p., photographs by author, \$9.95. Presents a many-sided image of the bat as a fascinating member of the natural ecosystem, based on scientists' reports and the naturalist's own field studies on caves between Delaware and Guatemala.

**WORLDS BEYOND:** A Report on the Search for Life in Space—Ian Ridpath—Har-Row, 1976, 8x12, 176 p., photographs, drawings, paper, \$6.95. Reviews the current state of the search for possibilities of extraterrestrial life.
