ANCIENT MYSTERIES—Rupert Furneaux—McGraw, 1977, 230 p., photographs, \$7.95. Brings together a mass of data in describing historical and ongoing disputes over some 30 megalithic, biblical ethnographic and archeological curiosities. [1]

THE ATLAS OF EARLY MAN—Jacquetta Hawkes with David Trump—St. Martin, 1976, 9x11, 256 p., photographs, 1,000 drawings, maps, charts, tables, \$15. For the general reader and serious student, atlas offers comprehensive treatment of concurrent developments in early history from 25,000 B.C. to A.D. 500, includes atlas of archaeological sites. [2]

THE BIOLOGY OF GOD: A Scientist's Study of Man, the Religious Animal—Alistair Hardy—Taplinger, 1976, 238 p., \$9.95. In this book zoologist is concerned with relating religion to biological evolution, the theory of behavioral selection, discoveries in animal behavior, developments in psychology, parapsychology, and recent theological thinking. COSMOLOGY NOW—Laurie John, Ed., introd. by Sir Bernard Lovell—Taplinger, 1976, 168 p., photographs, drawings, \$10.95. A group of theorists here present the best descriptions of the inverse which can be given today. [4]

DIABETES: The New Approach—Milton J. Brothers, M.D.—G&D, 1976, 239 p., illus., \$8.95. Specialist summarizes for the layman the currently available information about the nature of the disorder, the therapeutic approaches, the complications of diabetes, and personal management of the disease. [5]

DICTIONARY OF GEOLOGICAL TERMS—American Geological Institute—Anchor/Doubleday, 1976, rev. ed., 480 p., paper, \$3.50. Original paperback, contains full definitions of some 8,500 terms in the earth sciences, intended for the use of students, teachers and hobbyists. [6]

THE GREAT INTERNATIONAL DISASTER BOOK—James Cornell—Scribner, 1976, 392 p., photographs, tables, \$12.50. Scientist catalogs, describes and analyzes the most disastrous hurricanes, typhoons, tidal waves, earthquakes, fires, floods, avalanches, volcanic eruptions, explosions, plaques and shipwrecks. [7]

THE HIGH FRONTIER: Human Colonies in Space—Gerald K. O'Neill—Morrow, 1977, 288 p., 24 plates, diagrams, \$8.95. Physicist and originator of the space colony concept describes the prospect of habitats and islands for humanity in space, of high-orbital manufacturing facilities, how to get there and live there, how the economics might work out. HOMEOWNER'S GUIDE TO SOLAR HEATING AND COOLING—William M. Foster—TAB Bks, 1976, 196 p., illus.m tables, \$7.95; paper, \$4.95. Advice on how to select, install and maintain solar heating and cooling, and hot water systems. [9]

IMPROVING YOUR MEMORY—Laird S. Cermak—Norton, 1975, 123 p., \$6.95. Research psychologist's nontechnical book explains techniques of attention, organization, mediation, imagery and mnemonics, designed to aid short- and long-term memory. [10]

MORE THAN TWO ASPIRIN: Hope for Your Headache Problem—Seymour Diamond, M.D. and William Barry Furlong—Follett, 300 p., \$8.95. A reference book on the different kinds of headaches, migraine, drugs and chemicals relating to headaches, life-style affecting headache problems, and 24 detailed case histories, lists of doctors and clinics specializing in headaches. OUR CHANGING UNIVERSE: The New Astronomy—John Gribbin—Dutton, 1976, 160 p., color and b&w photographs, \$11.95. Concise outline of the currently known universe as explored by radio and X-ray astronomy. [12]

POISONS AND TOXINS—Joan Arehart-Treichel—Holiday, 1976, 160 p., photographs, drawings, \$6.95. Examines the dangers to humans of toxins derived from microbes, garden plants, venomous animals, household and garden chemicals, suicide poisons, and poisons in warfare. [13]

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS AND THEIR SIDE EFFECTS—Edward L. Stein—G&D, 1976, 96 p., \$5.95; paper, \$3.95. Tabulated listing of 150 most frequently prescribed drugs, tells why each drug is prescribed, necessary precautions, side effects, generics. [14]

PROLONGEVITY—Albert Rosenfeld—Knopf, 1976, 280 p., \$8.95. Reports on a wide range of scientific discoveries now being made about aging and dying, their promise of an extended human life span without senility, and explores the consequences of such a prospect. Full bibliography included. [15]

THE RELATIVITY EXPLOSION—Martin Gardner—Vintage, 1976, rev. ed., 200 p., illus. by Anthony Ravielli, paper, \$3.95. Completely revised, updated edition of *Relativity for the Million*, explains why quasars, pulsars, black holes and the new atomic clocks are vindicating Einstein's theory. [16]

THE SOLAR HOME BOOK: Heating, Cooling and Designing with the Sun—Bruce Anderson with Michael Riordan—Cheshire Bks, 1976, 297 p., illus. by Edward A. Wong, paper, \$7.50. Addressed to home owners, builders and architects, discusses fundamentals of solar energy and its applications, such as flat-plate collectors, heat storage methods, integrated solar designs, as well as low-cost do-it-yourself projects. SPACE SCIENCE AND ASTRONOMY: Escape from Earth—Thornton Page and Lou Williams Page, Eds.—Macmillan, 1976, 484 p., 150 photographs and diagrams, tables, \$13.95. More than 135 articles by scientists and space technicians cover spectacular achievements by manned and unmanned spacecraft, from discussion of concepts and hazards of space, through moon and Mars explorations to galactic observations. SYMPTOMS: The Complete Home Medical Encyclopedia—Sigmund Stephen Miller, Ed.—Crowell, 1977, 668 p., illus., \$17.95. Combines and interrelates clear professional description of some 650 symptoms (Part 1) with up-to-date medical reference book (Part 2). Excellent briefing section for good health, tables, glossary, index are included. [19]

U.S. OBSERVATORIES: A Directory and Travel Guide—H. T. Kirby-Smith—Van Nos Reinhold, 1976, 174 p., photographs, map, \$11.95; paper, \$6.95. Most complete reference to nearly 300 U.S. optical and radio observatories, their location, equipment and research, describes 15 major ones in depth. In addition lists telescopes and planetariums. [20]

WIND-CATCHERS: American Windmills of Yesterday and Tomorrow—Volta Torrey—Greene, 1976, 237 p., photographs, \$12.95. Well illustrated, all-inclusive overview of what is known about wind-power generation, in readable narrative for informing the general reader. [21]
