**ANIMAL COMMUNICATION**—Hubert and Mable Frings—U of Okla Pr, 1977, 2nd rev. ed., 207 p., photographs, drawings, \$9.95. Pioneer researchers in the field of animal communication, offer the layman an absorbing new way of looking at the animal world, a view of the earth's creatures engaged in a complex network of purposeful message bearing.

**ANNUAL REVIEW OF MEDICINE: Selected Topics in Clinical Sciences, Vol. 28**—William P. Greger, C. H. Coggins and E. W. Hancock, Eds.—Annual Reviews, 1977, 537 p., illus., \$17. Articles range from "The Association of Genes in the Major Histocompatibility Complex and Disease Susceptibility" to "Diagnosis of Pulmonary Embolism."

**THE COLLAPSING UNIVERSE**—Isaac Asimov—Walker, 1977, 204 p., tables, \$8.95. In telling the story of the black holes to the layman, the author clarifies the scientific facts behind the brilliant new perceptions of the cosmos.

**DANGEROUS PLANTS**—John Tampion—Universe Bks, 1977, 176 p., 100 drawings, tables, \$15.95. Professional botanist's book for the general reader, describes in detail 100 potentially lethal plants. Discusses plant poisons, treatment, allergies, and natural toxic components in foodstuffs.

**A DICTIONARY OF ELECTROCHEMISTRY**—C. W. Davies and A. M. James—Halsted Pr, 1976, 246 p., diagrams, tables, \$19.75. Entrances arranged in alphabetical sequence, from *Accumulator to Zinc, electro-metalurgy*.

**A DICTIONARY OF THERMODYNAMICS**—A. M. James—Halsted Pr, 1976, 262 p., diagrams, tables, \$14.95. Reference for scientists, alphabetically arranged, from *absolute molar entropy to Zeroth law of thermodynamics*.

**THE EDGE OF THE POND**—William White, Jr.—Sterling, 1977, 80 p., color and b&w photographs, diagrams, \$4.95. Copiously illustrated, describes the nearly closed system, the plants and animals, the air-soil interface, and ways to keep and study pond organisms.

**GRZIMEK'S ENCYCLOPEDIA OF ECOLOGY**—Bernhard Grzimek, Joachim Illies and Wolfgang Klausewitz, Eds.—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 705 p., color plates, drawings, tables, \$39.50. Written by 43 leading authorities, this reference volume explores the interrelationships of animals and man to their environment.

**HANDBOOK OF AGING AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES**—Robert H. Binstock, Ethel Shanas et al., Eds.—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 700 p., diagrams, tables, \$32.50. Systematic reference, organizes, evaluates and interprets research data, concepts, theories and issues on the social aspects of gerontology.

**HOW TO FEED YOUR HYPERACTIVE CHILD**—Laura J. and George E. Stevens and Rosemarv B. Stoner; foreword by Wendell A. Riggs, M.D.—Doubleday, 1977, 240 p., illus.,

\$7.95. Medically-oriented cookbook, contains 400 additive- and salicylate-free recipes for families with a hyperactive child.

**JANE'S POCKET BOOK OF RESEARCH AND EXPERIMENTAL AIRCRAFT**—Michael J. H. Taylor, Compiler; John R. Taylor, Ed.—Collier/Macmillan, 1977, 259 p., 125 photographs, paper, \$5.95. Vital data on 125 of the world's most exciting research and experimental aircraft flown in the more than 30 years since the end of World War II.

**JANE'S POCKET BOOK OF SPACE EXPLORATION**—T. M. Wilding-White—Collier/Macmillan, 1977, 238 p., photographs, paper, \$5.95. Depicts and describes vehicles, U.S. and foreign, in five categories—manned, interplanetary, scientific and applications, plus launch vehicles. Lists role, data, height, diameter, orbital mass, spacecraft, payload program and launch vehicle. Includes chronology tables.

**THE KEY TO THE UNIVERSE: A Report on the New Physics**—Nigel Calder—Viking, 1977, 200 p., photographs, diagrams, \$14.95. Without technical jargon, the richly illustrated book introduces the reader to the new forms of cosmic forces, the realms of galaxies and atoms, the discoveries of high-energy research and astrophysics.

**PHYSICS, PATENTS AND POLITICS: A Biography of Charles Grafton Page**—Robert C. Post—Sci Hist Pubns, 1977, illus., \$15.95. Biography of a 19th-century American who was a versatile experimentalist, an effective reformer, and the first eminent U.S. scientist hired to become patent examiner.

**THE RED LIMIT: The Search for the Edge of the Universe**—Timothy Ferris, introd. by Carl Sagan—Morrow, 1977, 287 p., photographs, \$10. About 20th-century astronomers and their major discoveries. Title refers to the finding that if a galaxy was receding, its light waves would shift toward the red end of the spectrum, leading astronomers to the discovery of the expanding universe.

**THE RIDDLE OF THE WINDS**—W. S. Kals—Doubleday, 1977, 208 p., illus. by author, \$7.95. On the influence of winds on man—everyday winds, domestic and global, beneficial and destructive winds, and the tools and techniques of forecasting.

**THE SECRET HISTORY OF THE ATOMIC BOMB**—Anthony Cave Brown and Charles B. MacDonald, Eds.—Dial Pr/Delta, 1977, 600 p., plates, \$16.95; paper, \$5.95. Comprehensive account of how scientific theory was turned into the reality of making the first deadly atomic weapon. Includes Smyth report, history of auxiliary projects, Oak Ridge, Hanford, and Los Alamos projects, and the dropping of the bomb.

**THE SMELL BOOK: Scents, Sex and Society**—Ruth Winter—Lippincott, 1976, 176 p., \$7.95. Tells what is known about the sense of smell, smell signatures, primary odors, sickly smells, the scent of sex, perfumes, scent manipulators, and the human use of common smells.

**SOLAR ENERGY: Technology and Applications**—J. Richard Williams—Ann Arbor Science, 1977, rev. ed., 185 p., photographs, diagrams, tables, \$9.95; paper, \$6.95. Succinct, clearly written, incorporates new data throughout. Includes 12-page table of "degree dates" indicating specific local conditions.

**SPACE, TIME AND SPACETIME**—Lawrence Sklar—U of Cal Pr, 1977, 423 p., diagrams, paper, \$5.95. Reprint of 1974 award-winning treatise on the philosophy of spacetime.

**TEMPERAMENT AND DEVELOPMENT**—Alexander Thomas, M.D. and Stella Chess, M.D.—Brunner/Mazel, 1977, 270 p., \$13.50. Based on 20-year longitudinal study, report shows the significance of temperament, as it interacts with the environment, for normal and deviant psychological development of the different groups of children who have been followed from infancy into adolescence and adulthood.

**TO BE AN INVALID: The Illness of Charles Darwin**—Ralph Colp, Jr., M.D.—U of Chicago Pr, 1977, 285 p., plates, \$15; \$17.50 after 7/1/77. Drawing on primary source material, the author gives annotated account of Darwin's protracted states of ill health, with psychiatric interpretations.

**THE UNFINISHED AGENDA: The Citizen's Policy Guide to Environmental Issues**—Gerald O. Barney, Ed.—Crowell, 1977, 184 p., \$7.95; paper, \$3.95. A Task Force Report by the Rockefeller Brothers Fund.

**THE VIENNA MEDICAL SCHOOL OF THE 19th CENTURY**—Erna Lesky—Johns Hopkins U Pr, 1977, 604 p., 100 photographs, \$18.50. Richly documented history of one of the great international training centers, pioneering in many areas of specialization. This scholarly work presents a full exposition of a brilliant epoch in medical history.

**THE VNR CONCISE ENCYCLOPEDIA OF MATHEMATICS**—W. Gellert et al., Eds.—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 760 p., 55 plates, 700 diagrams in color, \$14.95. Explains every specialized area of mathematics, systematically subdivided, describes the interrelationships between the various mathematical branches that have emerged from antiquity to our time.

**VOYAGE TO GREENLAND: A Personal Initiation into Anthropology**—Frederica de Laguna—Norton, 1977, 283 p., plates, maps, \$9.95. Reminiscences and letters tell the story of a young woman embarking on her first field trip to unexplored Arctic territory.

**WHAT CAN GROW IN THE SHADE?**—Suzanne Warner Pierot—Liveright, 1977, 221 p., photographs, \$9.95. Horticulturist shares her tested experience, describes hundreds of plants that thrive under trees, discusses soil conditions and care; includes lists of shade-loving plants for each area in the U.S., and list of special plant societies.

**WILDLY SUCCESSFUL PLANTS: A Handbook of North American Weeds**—Lawrence J. Crockett—Macmillan, 1977, 268 p., illus. by Joanne Bradley, \$12.95. Describes in detail over 200 flowering and herbaceous plants—trees, shrubs, vines, and grasses. Presents dicotyledonous species for easy identification.

**THE ZAPOTECs: Princes, Priests and Peasants**—Joseph W. Whitecotton—U of Okla Pr, 1977, 338 p., photographs, drawings, tables, \$14.95. Traces the social and cultural history of an indigenous New World people who have continuously inhabited the state of Oaxaca in southern Mexico from 1500 B.C. until the present.
