**APOLLO SOYUZ MISSION REPORT**—Chester M. Lee, Ed.—AAS(UNIVELT), Advances in the Astronautical Sciences, Vol. 34, 1977, 322 p., illus., \$35. Contains a post-flight evaluation of the performance of the docking system and docking module, as well as the overall performance of the Apollo spacecraft and experiments.

**BIOCHEMICAL METHODS IN CELL CULTURE AND VIROLOGY**—Robert J. Kuchler—Halsted Pr, 1977, 331 p., illus., \$30. A summary of the latest methods used in growing, handling and studying animal cells and viruses, emphasizing the theory and/or background for the development of each procedure.

**BIOLOGY OF NEMATODES**—Neil A. Croll and Bernard E. Matthews—Halsted Pr, 1977, 201 p., illus., \$13.75. An introductory book which presents a unified view of the whole range of nematodes which are among the most abundant organisms on earth.

**CURIOSITIES OF THE CUBE**—Ernest R. Ranucci and Wilma E. Rollins—T.Y. Crowell, 1977, 111 p., illus. by Henry Roth, \$6.95. In simple language and well illustrated by many drawings, this common shape is dissected, turned inside out, faces and angles examined as the reader explores with models he constructs. Games to play with cubes are included.

**EARLY WILDLIFE PHOTOGRAPHERS**—C.A.W. Guggisberg—Taplinger, 1977, 128 p., illus., \$9.95. A tribute to the men and women who underwent incredible difficulties to record wildlife by camera. Includes many fascinating early wildlife photographs.

**THE EGYPTIANS**: An Introduction to Egyptian Archaeology—John Ruffle—Cornell U Pr, 1977, 224 p., illus., color plates, \$12.50. The ancient Egyptian civilization over 3,000 years formed a heritage of fine sculpture, painting, literature, scientific observation, religious and moral philosophy while reaching a high level of achievement in the practical arts and politics. This book presents the material remains of this legacy.

**ENCLOSING BEHAVIOR**—Robert B. Bechtel—DH&R, 1977, illus., \$20. Behavior, not space, is enclosed by architecture is the author's premise. This book analyzes the methods of "ecological psychology" and shows how these methods can be applied to practical problems of house design and community planning.

**ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ANALYSIS: A New Dimension in Decision Making**—R.K. Jain et al—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 330 p., \$22.50. Provides readers with insight into various complex areas of the environment and furnishes guidance in the systemic and interdisciplinary approach to environmental impact analysis.

**ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF MINING**—C.G. Downs and J. Stocks—Halsted Pr, 1977, 371 p., illus., \$37.50. An interdisciplinary approach to the environmental effects of mining and processing the more important minerals and the ways of minimizing these effects.

**ETHICAL POLICY IN MENTAL HEALTH CARE: The Goals of Psychiatric Intervention**—Laurence R. Tancredi and Andrew E. Slaby—Produst (N Watson), 1977, 153 p., \$10. Concerned with evidences of injustice in the health care system, particularly the injustices in the delivery of psychiatric care.

**GEOMORPHOLOGY AND TIME**—J.B. Thornes and D. Brunsden—Halsted Pr, 1977, 208 p., illus., graphs, \$12.95. An attempt to provide an overall framework within which to consider and compare old and new approaches to time, one of the central themes of geomorphology.

**GROWTH PSYCHOLOGY: Models of the Healthy Personality**—Duane Schultz—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 151 p., \$7.95. Presents models of the healthy mind as seen by seven famous psychologists and psychiatrists. Written for those with little formal training in psychology.

**HISTORICAL STUDIES IN THE PHYSICAL SCIENCES**—Russell McCormmach and Lewis Pyenson, Eds.—Johns Hopkins, 1977, 300 p., illus., \$17.50. Seven studies in the period from the 18th century to the present.

**THE INNER PLANETS: New Light on the Rocky Worlds of Mercury, Venus, Earth, the Moon, Mars and the Asteroids**—Clark R. Chapman—Scribner, 1977, 170 p., illus., \$7.95. Explores what we have learned about the inner planets and discusses the implications of this information for our understanding of earth.

**INSIGHTS FROM THE BLIND: Comparative Studies of Blind and Sighted Infants**—Selma Fraiberg with Louis Fraiberg—Basic, 1977, 297 p., \$11.95. For those interested in developmental theory, as well as those concerned with the blind and the handicapped.

**LITTLE MAMMALS OF THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST**—Ellen B. Kritzman—Pacific Search, 1977, 120 p., illus., paper, \$5.95. The "little mammals" are shrews and moles; pikas, rabbits and hares; and squirrels, rats, mice and their relatives. Beautifully illustrated with b&w and color photographs and maps showing the animal's range. Descriptions of animals are grouped by habitat.

**THE MAGNIFICENT WEST: GRAND CANYON**—Milton Goldstein—Doubleday, 1977, 201 p., color plates, \$24.95. Spectacular color photographs of the grandest of all canyons with an introduction that includes a description of the canyon, West, East and North rims and its geology.

**THE MIRACLE OF VISION**—Arthur S. Freese—Har-Row, 1977, 181 p., drawings, \$8.95. A readable book about sight and vi-

sion, covering the anatomy and optics of the eye, the physiology and psychology of vision, perception and visual illusions, problems of the eye and the restoration of sight.

**THE MOON BOOK**—Bevan M. French—Penguin, 1977, 287 p., illus., paper, \$4.95. What we have learned from the Apollo program about our closest neighbor in space.

**NATIVE AMERICAN ASTRONOMY**—Anthony F. Aveni, Ed.—U of Tex Pr, 1977, 286 p., drawings and photographs, \$15.95. A collection of interdisciplinary essays which explore the astronomical knowledge and beliefs of pre-Columbian peoples in the Americas.

**PSYCHOPHARMACOLOGY: A Biochemical and Behavioral Approach**—Lewis S. Seiden and Linda A. Dykstra—Van Nos Reinhold, 1977, 451 p., illus., graphs, \$19.95. Intended as an introduction to the research literature in experimental psychopharmacology for students and professionals in psychology, pharmacology, psychiatry, biological and medical sciences.

**PSYCHOTHERAPY AND GROWTH: A Family Systems Perspective**—W. Robert Beavers—Brunner/Mazel, 388 p., \$17.50. About people and how they get to be the way they are and how parents and therapist can be more effective in furthering the growth of the individual.

**THE RED LIMIT: The Search for the Edge of the Universe**—Timothy Ferris—Morrow, 1977, 287 p., illus., \$10. For the intelligent lay reader, an up-to-date discussion of cosmology. Introduction by Carl Sagan.

**SOCIOLOGY IN THE BALANCE: A Critical Essay**—Johan Goudsblom—Columbia U Pr, 232 p., \$12.50. A brief introduction and critique of the discipline of sociology as a whole. A revised translation of the author's *Balans vans de Sociologie* published in 1974.

**TECHNOLOGY, WORLD POLITICS & AMERICAN POLICY**—Victor Basiuk—Columbia U Pr, 1977, 409 p., \$17.50. Concentrates on modern technology, analyzing its present and future impact on international relations.

**THE VIRUS: A History of the Concept**—Sally Smith Hughes—Sci His Pub (N Watson), 1977, 140 p., illus., \$6.95. Written in nontechnical language for those with a general interest in science as well as for virologists and historians of science and medicine.

**WATCHING BIRDS: An Introduction to Ornithology**—Roger F. Pasquier, foreword by Roger Tory Peterson—HM, 1977, 301 p., illus. by Margaret La Farge, \$9.95. A guide, with beautiful drawings, through the main topics of ornithology for the bird watcher and the environmentalist including sections on conservation, attracting and caring for birds, a review of current concerns of ornithology and a bibliography for further reading.

**WAYS OF THE SIX-FOOTED**—Anna Botsford Comstock—Cornell U Pr, 1977, 152 p., illus., \$5.95. A reissue of the 1903 edition with a new foreword by Edward H. Smith. Charmingly illustrates the social organization of insects, their communication by sound, their employment of mimicry as defense strategy, migration and other adaptive features.
