COMETS — Patrick Moore — Scribner, 1978, 149 p., illus., paper, \$2.95. A discussion for the layman covering the origin of comets, lost comets, comet lore, comet paths and famous comets. Originally published in hard cover in 1976.

FOOD: Past, Present and Future—Egon Larsen—Muller (Crane-Russak Co), 1977, 112 p., illus by David Armitage, \$7.95. Traces from prehistory through to the future the ways in which human beings have used and will use foods and tells what effects foods have had on human history.

A FORTRAN COLORING BOOK — Roger Emanuel Kaufman — MIT Pr. 1978, 285 p., drawings, paper, \$6.95. Computer programming with Fortran, presented with humor and cartoons.

HUMAN INFORMATION PROCESSING: Handbook of Learning and Cognitive Processes, Volume 5—W. K. Estes, Ed.—LEA (Halsted Pr), 1978, 337 p., charts and graphs, \$19.95. Reflects a single theoretical orientation characterized by the term "human information processing," but ranges over a very broad spectrum of cognitive activities.

IS THERE A DOCTOR IN THE ZOO? — David Taylor—Lippincott, 1978, 250 p., drawings by Frankie Coventry, \$8.95. What led this famous veterinarian to his profession and his early experiences as a zoo vet are told in readable style. Beautiful line drawings.

LOOK WHO'S TALKING!—Emily Hahn—T Y Crowell, 1978, 168 p., illus., \$8.95. Tells of recent experiments in animal communication with man—not only with chimps but also with birds, horses, elephants, dolphins and many other species.

THE MAGIC OF GOLD—Jenifer Marx—Doubleday, 1978, 470 p., illus., \$10.95. Our first message to worlds beyond the solar system is carried on a gold plaque, chosen because of the remarkable chemical and physical characteristics of gold. This book tells the story of mankind's fascination with gold through the centuries.

THE MINDFUL BRAIN: Cortical Organization and the Group-Selective Theory of Higher Brain Function — Gerald M. Edelman and Vernon B. Mountcastle — MIT Pr. 1978, 100 p., drawings, \$10. Two papers that examine from different directions the relationships that connect the high brain function — learning, thinking, memory — with what goes on at the most basic levels of neural activity, with particular stress on the role of local neuronal circuits.

THE NEW CHALLENGE OF THE STARS—Patrick Moore and David Hardy—Rand, 1977, 63 p., drawings, \$9.95. The imaginative essays and illustrations on the exploration of our universe and beyond are based on knowledge or theories we hold at present and as such may be predictions of the future course of space exploration. Beautiful color illustrations.

ON AESTHETICS IN SCIENCE — Judith Wechsler, Ed. — MIT Pr. 1978, 180 p., illus., \$12.50. Scientific ideas, models and hypotheses develop within a cultural framework rooted in the scientist's time in history. This book examines the aesthetics of



formulae, concepts, models and processes in essays by four scientists and two social scientists.

THE PROSPEROUS GARDENER: A Guide to Gardening the Organic Way — James Jankowiak — Rodale Pr Inc, 1978, 251 p., drawings, \$8.95. A basic gardening book telling ways you can make your own piece of ground a productive garden or farm while replenishing the land through natural methods

THE QUEEN AND I — Edward A. Weiss — Har-Row, 1978, 204 p., illus., \$8.95. Describes the author's discovery of the fascinating world of beekeeping. Tells the novice how to get started in apiculture and the more advanced beekeeper how to get the best results from bees.

SCIENTISTS MUST WRITE: A Guide to Better Writing for Scientists, Engineers and Students — Robert Barrass — Halsted Pr. 1978, 176 p., \$8.95. Written by a scientist, this book is about the ways in which writing is important to scientists and engineers and is a concise guide for those who wish to improve their writing and their oral presentations

THE SEASONS OF A MAN'S LIFE—Daniel J. Levinson — Knopf, 1978, 363 p., \$10.95. Based on the study at Yale University that demonstrated the existence of stages of adult development, this book for the general reader discusses the major seasons of adulthood, from early adult transition at about 17 years to 22 years of age to late adult transition at about 60 years to 65 years.

SECOND-LANGUAGE ACQUISITION IN CHILDHOOD — Barry McLaughlin — LEA (Halsted Pr), 1978, 239 p., \$14.95. A survey of the literature on second-language acquisition. Bilingual education and second-language learning problems are examined.

TIME AND TRADITIONS: Essays in Archaeological Interpretation—Bruce G. Trigger—Columbia U Pr. 1978, 273 p., \$12.50. The theme

of these essays is that a fuller understanding of prehistory is an integral aspect of the scientific study of human behavior.

THE TOKYO PUZZLES — Kobon Fujimura, translated by Fumie Adachi, edited and with introduction by Martin Gardner—Scribner, 1978, 184 p., illus., \$8.95. A translation of Japan's leading puzzlemaker's latest book. Presents problems selected from classic Japanese puzzles, retelling them with new story lines and in many cases giving them fresh angles.

THE WHITE KIKUYU: Louis S. B. Leakey—Anne Malatesta and Ronald Friedland — McGraw, 1978, 140 p., illus., \$7.95. Presents the vigorous life of the famous anthropologist who was born and reared on the continent where he first became interested in Stone Age artifacts and where he spent almost 50 years in anthropological research, living to see his sons carry on his work.
