Man without animals, says the author, condemns himself to inhumanity. Klein's task, he feels, is to protect animals, draw them closer to us, promote our knowledge and love of them.

The history of the development of aids to vision from ancient times to the present. Discusses the functions of ophthalmologists, optometrists and opticians and suggests future possibilities in vision aids.

NO TIME FOR HOUSE PLANTS: A Busy Person's Guide to Indoor Gardening—Jerry Minnich—U of Okla Pr, 1979, 142 p., illus., paper, \$5.95. Helps you choose the right plant for the conditions in your home and tells how to maintain plants with an absolute minimum of care.

OPUS 200 — Isaac Asimov — HM, 1979, 329 p., \$10.95. An anthology of Asimov's favorite selections, from his second hundred books, that is divided into subject categories, such as astronomy, robots, words, chemistry, humor, mathematics, social sciences and literature.

PERCEPTION: The World Transformed Lloyd Kaufman — Oxford U Pr, 1979, 416 p., illus., \$19.95. Assuming little or no knowledge of physics and physiology and stressing basic concepts and theories, this book describes the discoveries and ideas of those who have contributed to the field of sense perception. Attempts to convey something of the excitement experienced by those working at the frontiers of this science.

PERSONAL COMPUTERS: What They Are & How To Use Them—Byron Wels—P-H, 1978, 193 p., illus., \$12.95, paper, \$5.95. Discusses how to buy a computer, what makes the computer "tick," accessories, programing a computer, maintaining a home computer, how microcomputers are being used today in many aspects of our lives. Includes a glossary.

PLANTS THAT EAT ANIMALS—J. H. Prince -Nelson, 1979, 92 p., illus., \$7.95. These plants are found among several widely separated groups of plants and in widely separated parts of the world. The carnivorous habit in plants appears to have evolved because some plants that grow in poor acidic conditions need to supplement their nutrition with additional nitrogen. The most appropriate carnivorous plants to grow at home are discussed.

**PSYCHOLOGY AND WOMEN: In Transi**tion — Jeanne E. Gullahorn — Wiley, 1979, 224 p., illus., \$15.95. Covers the areas of historical and psychobiological perspectives of sex-related behaviors, individuals and families in transition and psychology in transition.

SATURN AND BEYOND — Isaac Asimov -Lothrop, 1979, 222 p., illus., \$7.95. A simply written science book that discusses in some depth the four outermost planets and their satellites.

SEAL SONG—Brian Davies—Viking Pr, 1978, 94 p., color photographs by Eliot Porter, \$14.95. The natural history of the harp seal — their migratory and behavioral patterns, their breeding and physical characteristics. Tells of the destructive harp-seal hunt which, according to the author, is threatening these beautiful creatures with extinction (SN: 3/31/79, p. 202).

SPORTS, GAMES, AND PLAY: Social and Psychological Viewpoints — Jeffrey H. Goldstein, Ed. — LEA (Wiley), 1979, 456 p., \$24,95. The purpose of these contributions is to reflect the diversity of approaches, both conceptual and methodological, that psychologists, anthropologists, sociologists and others have brought to bear on sports, games and play.

USING THE TELESCOPE: A Handbook for Astronomers — J. Hedley Robinson — Wiley, 1978, 112 p., illus., \$9.95. Instructions for the selection, care and maintenance of the telescope. Discusses correct observational techniques for the sun, moon, each planet, asteroids, comets, stars, star clusters, nebulae and galaxies.
