

More obscure groups are characterized at the family level, while the more common and conspicuous insects are treated in more detail. U of Cal Pr. 1980, 388 p., color/b&w illus., \$15.95.

THE HERPES BOOK - Richard Hamilton. The herpes virus is one of the most prevalent viral diseases. To most infected people it brings discomfort in the form of blisterlike sores. Herpes does not respond to any currently known form of therapy; once a person is infected, the virus remains for life.

HOW TO SOLARIZE YOUR HOUSE: A Practical Guide to Design and Construction for Solar Heating—Thomas Scott Dean with Jay W. Hedden. Written to describe "how" in sufficient detail for the average person to be able to incorporate a solar heating system using liquid-cooled flatplate collectors into a new or existing building. The components for this type of system are, for the most part, readily available and relatively inexpensive. Scribner, 1980, 162 p., illus., \$20.

LAYING WASTE: The Poisoning of America by Toxic Chemicals — Michael H. Brown. The newspaper reporter who broke the Love Canal story covers that story in this book and goes on to eport on widespread waste dumping across the United States. Numerous communities from Maine to California that have been contaminated by toxic chemical wastes are cited. Pantheon, 1980, 351 p.,

LIVING ARCHAEOLOGY — R.A. Gould, An attempt to demonstrate the general principles of a unified theory of ethnoarchaeology. Uses the recent work being done with Australian aborigines as a case study in ethnoarchaeological theory. Cambridge U Pr, 1980, 270 p., illus., \$27.50, paper, \$9.95.

OCEANS OF ENERGY: Reservoir of Power for the Future — Augusta Goldin. A simple science book that discusses the various kinds of potential energy from the ocean that can be converted into usable energy. HarBracel, 1980, 144 p., illus., \$8.95.

PARENTS AND PEERS IN SOCIAL DE-**VELOPMENT:** A Sullivan-Piaget Perspective — James Youniss. The author argues that the child's relations with his or her friends and peers make a distinctive and critically important contribution to social development. U of Chicago Pr, 1980, 301 p., \$23.

PERPETUAL MOTION: The History of an Obsession—Arthur W.J.G. Ord-Hume. The perpetual motion seeker was, in most cases, a dedicated scientist fettered not by his own ignorance, but by the limitations of scientific and mechanical knowledge of his time. TO MEND THE HEART — Lael Wertenbaker. An account of the history and the controversies of heart surgery with the pioneer heart surgeon Dwight Harken as the central figure. Viking Pr, 1980, 344 p., illus., \$14.95.

THE UNIVERSE: From Flat Earth to Black Holes—and Beyond—Isaac Asimov. Written for the general reader interested in astronomy, this third edition has been revised to include current information and such topics as black holes, white holes and quasars. WHAT ARE MY CHANCES? — Ben Eiseman. An increasing number of patients are becoming interested in sharing with their physicians the decision-making process that is so vital to the patient's future.
