

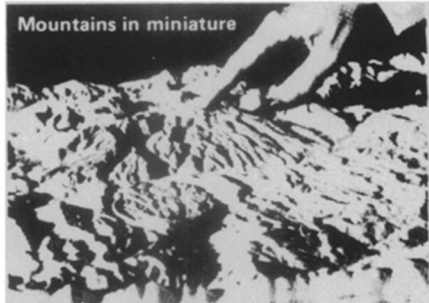

Describes the components of a typical computer system, the differences among maxi-, mini-, micro- and pocket computers and the main characteristics of computer languages. These educators tell how microcomputers are being used in the schools and the ways in which computers will change, enhance and influence the learning process. The authors discuss what hardware to look for, what to select from the array of peripherals, what kind of software to buy and include an assessment of the seven most popular machines. More than two million Americans have schizophrenia and each year another 100,000 persons will be diagnosed for the first time as schizophrenic. A clinical and research psychiatrist describes for the lay reader the nature of the disease, what symptoms do and do not characterize it, possible causes, and how schizophrenia is diagnosed and treated. Discusses what the family can do to be helpful and what effect this illness has on the family.
