Endometriosis — Julia Older. A complete discussion of a common but often undetected disease that can cause infertility and other major medical problems in women. Originally published in hardback in 1984. Scribner, 1985, 221 p., illus., paper, \$7.95.

Fusion: Science, Politics, and the Invention of a New Energy Source — Joan Lisa Bromberg. A history of the magnetic fusion energy program, concentrating on the fusion work at four federally funded sites: Lawrence Livermore Laboratory, Los Alamos and Oak Ridge Laboratories and the Princeton Plasma Physics Lab. Covers the period from the program's inception in 1951 through September 1978. Originally published in hardback in 1982. MIT Pr, 1985, 344 p., illus., paper, \$9.95.

The Great Waves — Douglas Myles, foreword by George Pararas-Carayannis. While most of the destructive tsunami have occurred in the Pacific Ocean, devastating tsunami have occurred in the Atlantic and Indian Oceans and in the Mediterranean Sea. This book provides background on the earth's structure, the underwater topography of the oceans and the earth's violent events, then proceeds to explain the tsunami, which is a geophysical as well as an oceanographic phenomenon. 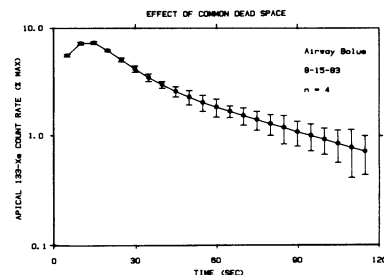
The Hidden Victims of Alzheimer's Disease: Families Under Stress — Steven H. Zarit, Nancy K. Orr and Judy M. Zarit. Gives a framework for understanding dementing illnesses such as Alzheimer's disease. Examines the causes of memory loss and the symptoms of dementia, provides guidelines for assessment and describes possible intervention to assist patients and their families. NYU Pr (Columbia U Pr), 1985, 218 p., \$30, paper, \$14.95.

The Natural History of Alcoholism — George E. Vaillant. The insights about alcoholism presented here are based on a study that followed 660 men from 1940 to 1980, from adolescence into late middle life. Information was collected about many aspects of their lives, including their use of alcohol. The data about these men's lives are supplemented by information from 100 alcohol-dependent men and women followed for eight years after being admitted to a clinic for detoxification. Originally published in hardback in 1983. Harvard U Pr, 1985, 359 p., charts & graphs, paper, \$9.95.

The Primary Source: Tropical Forests and our Future — Norman Myers. An internationally known environmentalist describes the biological richness and the ecological complexity of tropical forests. Examines the importance of these forests and the contributions they make to our welfare. Discusses the perils of and reasons for their destruction and presents hopeful solutions for the preservation of one of the planet's oldest surviving ecosystems.
