TO MOCK A MOCKINGBIRD By Raymond Smullyan



His adventure, which includes enchanted forests, talking birds, bird sociologists and a classic quest, provides for us along the way the pleasure of solving puzzles of increasing complexity until we reach the Master Forest and — thanks to Godel's famous theorem — the final revelation.
