Dioxin, Agent Orange: The Facts — Michael Gough. A biologist and director of the Risk Science Institute describes what dioxin is, how it came to be the problem it is, how people are exposed, where the dioxin comes from, how it enters the environment and where it goes. Industrial exposures to dioxin and company reactions are reported. Agent Orange, the link between dioxin and specific cancers, animal tests of dioxin toxicity, court decisions on dioxin, the present state of regulation and the future are discussed in this book intended for the general reader. Ecological Imperialism: The Biological Expansion of Europe, 900-1900 — Alfred W. Crosby. The author's thesis is that Europeans were able to displace native peoples in the Americas and Oceania because of the rapid triumph of the plants, animals and germs the Europeans brought with them. Cambridge UP, 1986, 368 p., illus., \$22.95.

The Late, Great Lakes: An Environmental History — William Ashworth. The Great Lakes give the United States its longest continuous coastline and hold one-fifth of the world's fresh water. This is an account of these important bodies of water, from their formation in the ice age to modern times, when they have undergone their most devastating changes, and on to the future, with the threat of pumping water from the Great Lakes for irrigation in a multistate area. Medical Uses of Statistics — John C. Bailar III and Frederick Mosteller, Eds. Surveys what clinical investigators reporting in the NEW ENGLAND JOURNAL OF MEDICINE are doing with statistical methods and helps the reader to understand those methods, emphasizing and explaining their purpose. Points out ways in which medical writers can make their reporting of methods and results more informative and their analyses of data more useful. NEJM Books, 1986, 425 p., paper, \$35.

Promise or Peril: The Strategic Defense Initiative — Zbigniew Brzezinski, Ed. Intended, according to the preface, to give the reader a well-rounded picture of the key issues surrounding strategic defense. Begins by tracing the historical background of strategic defense. Various contributors discuss whether a strategic defense system is technically feasible and strategically advisable. Presents the Soviet Union's position on strategic defense. Examines the implications of strategic defense for the Western alliance and its effect on the prospects for verifiable arms control, and looks at the moral aspects of strategic defense. Wide Awake at 3:00 A.M.: By Choice or By Chance? — Richard M. Coleman. A leading sleep expert provides a nontechnical account of current sleep research and therapy. Tells how our biological clocks work and how this sleep-wake cycle controls periods of sleep, alertness, mood and performance. Offers techniques that can be used to reset one's biological clock to combat such problems as jet lag, insomnia, depression, fatigue or changes in work schedules.
