## A Report from the Frontier on the Origin, Nature and Destiny of the Universe

Of late, contemplating the heavens has become an even more humbling experience than ever. The view from Palomar and other observatories has taught us that this 8,000-mile-wide ball of rock upon which we live is a mere pebble, compared with the vastness of space-time and the multiplicity of its inhabitants. This perception, of course, was attained only after humanity progressed through several stages of inquiry and technological expertise. To early stargazers, the sky surrounding Earth was simply a fair-faced Monday's universe. They imagined they stood at the center of a cosmos with exiled princesses, fabled beasts and mighty heroes looking down from above. In certain ancient societies, the celestial sphere was a vaulted roof, through which the fires of the gods flickered. Other cultures thought of each heavenly light as the soul of a departed one. From these early, creative attempts to understand the star-studded sky, a science was born. . . . [but] astronomy, it should be stressed, is more than a collection of facts. It is also people, observers and theoreticians alike, intent on wresting the secrets of the heavens out of each photon of light and cosmic ray that happens to reach the earth or a spaceborne detector. *Thursday's Universe* is also their story.
