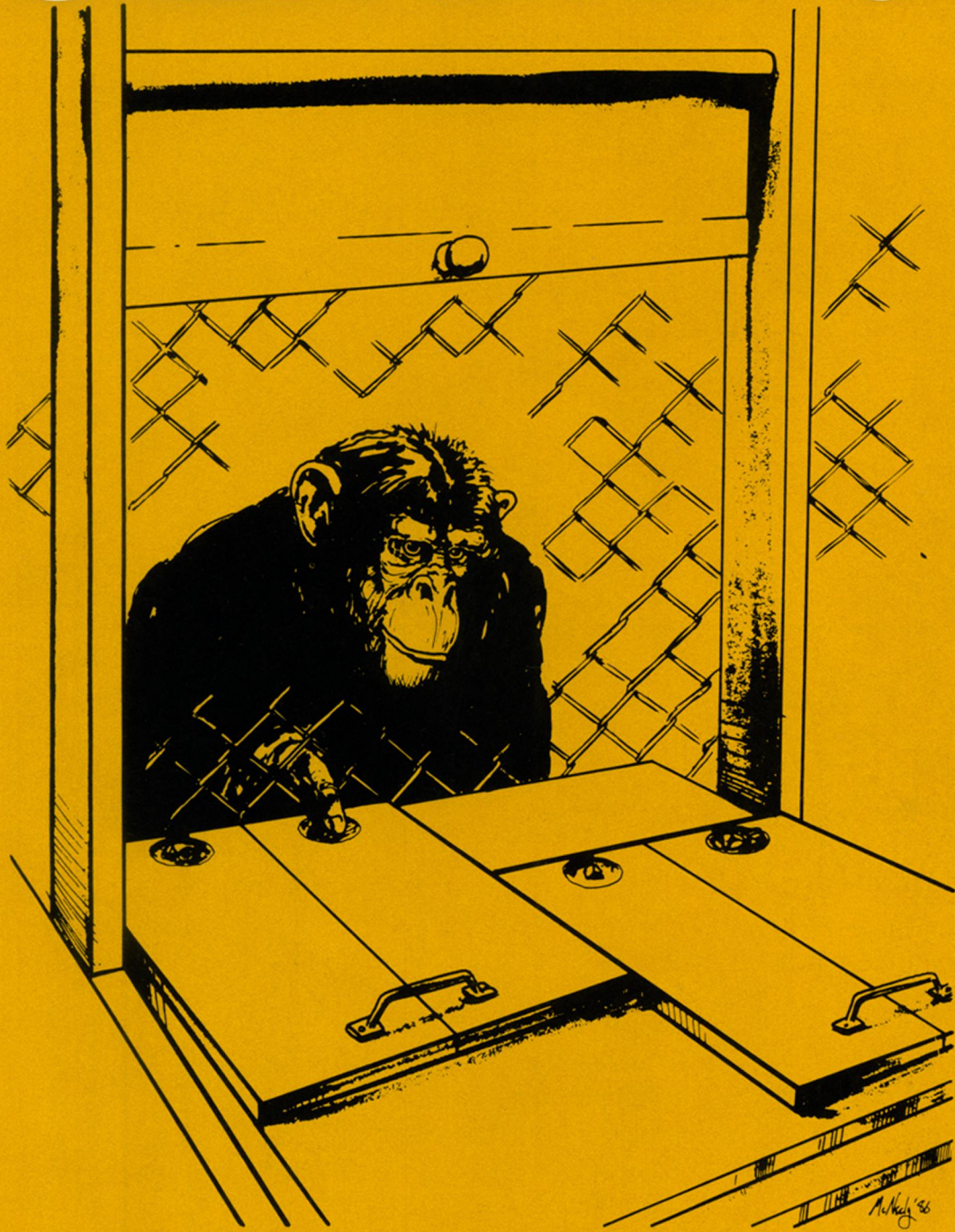

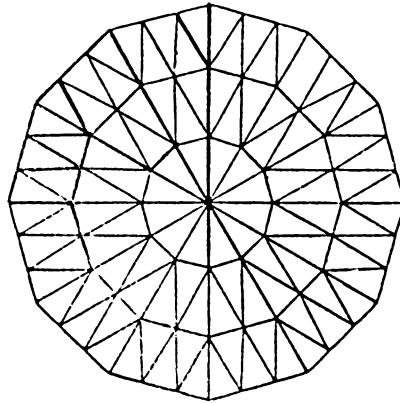

The Five Levels of Mathematical Reality



By Rudy Rucker

The "tools" Rucker examines are: the split between digital and analog processes, the notion of logic as a computing tool, the concept of communication as information-transmission and the recognition of the world's essentially random layers. Starting with a simple and lucid exploration of the five levels of reality in which an object can exist — number, space, logic, infinity and information — Rucker takes the reader into the realms of gigaplexes, numberskulls, cellular automata, Turing machines, fractals and Hilbert space. In each chapter, Rucker combines an aspect of mathematics with one of the universe — numbers and power, space and nature, logic and truth, randomness and creation — and in each, he considers the complexity of these relationships. — from the publisher

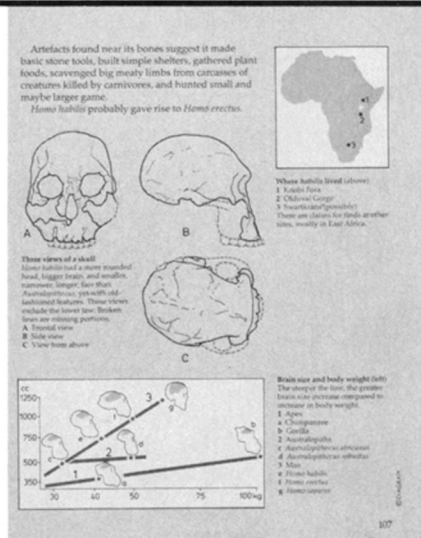
