
The Gardener's Index of Plants & Flowers — John Brookes, Kenneth A. Beckett and Thomas H. Everett. Presents principles of design and tells how to apply them to your existing garden or to the design of a new garden. Tells where, how and when to buy healthy plants, gives planting techniques and aftercare, discusses symptoms and treatment of common pests and diseases. The major portion of the book is the plant-finder's guide, which gives the vital statistics for over 4,000 plants — trees, shrubs, climbing plants, perennials, cacti and succulents, annuals and biennials, bulbs and water plants. What the Hands Reveal About the Brain — Howard Poizner et al. Recent findings from a research program in the field of cognitive neuropsychology that provide evidence that language is not limited to hearing and speech. Shows that there are primary linguistic systems that the deaf use that do not rely on spoken language.
