Neurological exams needed

I am disappointed in "Hyperactivity: The Family Factor" (SN: 6/18/88, p.399), in which psychiatrists are criticizing the treatment of this disorder.

Psychiatrists are noted for reticence to examine their patients and do neurological exams on them. At no point in this article was there any mention of the role of the neurological exam in aiding in the diagnosis of attention deficit disorder (ADD). Making a diagnosis on the basis of a history alone is like making a diagnosis of a heart attack without a blood count, enzyme study, electrocardiogram and so forth.

Most psychiatrists glibly criticize the treatment of children with ADD using Ritalin and other medications. When eight out of 10 of the symptoms and neurological signs are present, approximately 90 percent of these kids have a startling improvement on school work while on the medication.


