The Cosmic Blueprint

With each successive work, physicist Paul Davies — author of *God and the New Physics* and *Superforce* — journeys further into the fascinating mysteries of creation. In *The Cosmic Blueprint*, he rejects the idea of a universe at the mercy of random forces, advancing an argument for the existence of a predestined universal plan — an essential, progressively unfolding order.

Attempting to understand the secret creative power that bestows unity upon nature, Davies draws on recent discoveries in fields as diverse as brain research, biological evolution, computers and astrophysics. He argues that all matter and energy have the ability to self-organize according to common holistic principles.
