101 Discarding the Throwaway Society — John E. Young. January 1991. Examines the garbage crisis and surveys steps that can be taken to encourage waste reduction, reuse and recycling, giving examples of successful international community efforts.

100 Beyond the Petroleum Age: Designing a Solar Economy — Christopher Flavin and Nicholas Lenssen. December 1990. Profiles the technology available for harnessing renewable energy resources and the policy changes necessary to initiate the transition away from fossil fuels. Reviews the findings and current status of international efforts to tap renewable energy.

#98 Alternatives to the Automobile: Transport for Livable Cities — Marcia D. Lowe. October 1990. Outlines public-transport options available to reduce dependence on the world's 400-million-strong auto fleet and suggests ways to encourage drivers to switch over to public transport.

#94 Clearing the Air: A Global Agenda — Hilary F. French. January 1990. Proposes incentives to increase the efficiency of fossil-fuel use and encourage the use of non-polluting renewable energy sources by individuals and industry, and surveys cooperative and international alliances that have formed in the struggle against air pollution.

#90 Bicycle: Vehicle for a Small Planet — Marcia D. Lowe. September 1989. Outlines the costs and benefits of bicycle travel to the environment, the economy and individuals; how public policy can facilitate cycling; and why the bicycle seems the best alternative to mass transit in developing nations.

#82 Building on Success: The Age of Energy Efficiency — Christoper Flavin and Alan B. Durning. March 1988. Examines how energy efficiency is becoming a key determinant of national economic competitiveness and which nations are improving their effiency.

Handbook for Academic Authors

By Beth Luey

Written in a conversational style that is interesting to read, Beth Luey, an editor, author and lecturer, introduces the reader to the standard publishing contract and offers advice on how to negotiate. She gives clear, common-sense guidance on preparing the final manuscript, applying for permission to quote, and producing suitable artwork. A new chapter prepared for this edition explains how authors and publishers can process electronic manuscripts and describes how computer disks can be used to generate camera-ready copy.

The author also gives advice on revising dissertations for publication; writing and submitting journal articles; and planning, writing and publishing scholarly books. She tells how to handle the practical and diplomatic demands of editing a multiauthor volume or an anthology and provides an introduction to the very different world of textbook writing. A concluding chapter on prices and costs will help authors understand the business of publishing.


