

Wild Malaysia is a pictorial celebration of the natural history of southeast Asia's southernmost country and offshore islands, which are home to an enormous wealth of species. Topped by rainforest and ringed by coral reefs and transparent blue seas, Malaysia's tropical islands are as beautiful and untouched as anywhere in the world. Its vast and exotic wildlife includes elephants and the world's smallest rhinoceros, a profusion of monkeys and apes, the Clouded Leopard and Sun Bear, a spectacular variety of bird and marine life, and more than 100,000 species of plants.

Produced in association with the World Wide Fund for Nature, Wild Malaysia is a compilation of 400 superb color photographs of Malaysia's magnificent flora and fauna. An extensive introduction examines the topography, history, climate and cultures of Malaysia and provides an overview of the multiplicity of animal and plant species to be found there. Junaidi Payne also explains the complex interdependence of the forest ecosystem and details Malaysia's existing and proposed conservation programs and the important relationship between conservation and development. Individual chapters then illustrate the breathtaking diversity of Peninsular Malaysia's islands, coastal areas and hill forest (many of which have been designated as national parks); Sarawak's great rivers and cave systems; and Sabah's offshore islands with their coral reefs, marine life and — from the publisher
