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Consciousness Explained — Daniel C. Dennett. In this entertaining and thought-provoking exploration of the nature of human conscious ness, Dennett sifts through cognitive psychology, artificial intelligence, neuroscience and biology to present his own, radically different theory of consciousness. His discussion incorporates thought experiments to engage and challenge readers, and even those who do not agree with his incisive attacks on the consciousness theories of scholars such as Descartes should find plenty here of interest. The Encyclopedia of Gemstones and Minerals - Martin Holden. More than 225 entries describe and illustrate minerals from actinolite to zoisite, giving scientific information on the mineral's form, specific gravity and hardness as well as general information on where it is found, how it forms and how to recognize simulated and synthetic versions. Trivia highlights include that the largest diamond ever found was 3.106 carats and that real amber should float in seawater. Facts on File, 1991, 303 p., color illus., hardcover, \$45.00.

The Greenland Mummies - Jens Peder Hart Hansen, Jørgen Meldgaard and Jørgen Nordqvist, Eds. A detailed examination of the archaeological investigations conducted on eight mummified women and children found in Greenland in 1972 and what they reveal about medieval Inuit culture and living conditions. The bodies, dating back to 1475, were buried according to Inuit tradition and were remarkably preserved by the dry air and low temperature. The text is well illustrated with photographs and diagrams and, although technical, is accessible to general readers. Smithsonian, 1991, 192 p., color illus., hardcover, \$39.95.

Target Earth! Asteroid Collisions Past and Future - Jon Erickson. Focuses on how asteroid collisions have affected life on Earth, the search for impact craters and other evidence of collisions on Earth, and what can be done to avoid disastrous asteroid collisions in the future. Illustrated with diagrams and black-and-white photographs and written for readers ages 12 and up. TAB Bks, 1991, 176 p., illus., paperback, \$14.95.

The Triumph of the Embryo - Lewis Wolpert. A layperson's introduction to the astonishing process through which a single cell - a fertilized egg gives rise to the various adult forms of humans and animals, with millions of cells performing different functions. Wolpert explores how cells coordinate embryonic development, shared patterns of development among different species and related topics such as regeneration, growth, aging and cancer. His discussion is illustrated throughout with helpful, nontechnical drawings. A fascinating read for anyone curious about the replication and development of life. Wetlands of North America — Bates Littlehales and William A. Niering.
